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Reflection for the 3rd Sunday in O/T Year A22nd Jan 2023

After the death of Herod the Holy Family returned to Nazareth, where Jesus' hidden life began. It was not a waste of time. During those 30 years, Jesus "increased in wisdom, in stature & in favour with God & men". (Lk2:40) & were no less important than the time of his public ministry.

Today, in Matthew's Gospel, we are told that when Jesus heard that John the Baptist had been arrested, he returned to Galilee & settled in Capernaum by the sea.

Straight away he set about assembling his chosen disciples. The first ones were invited in pairs, including brothers from the same household.

Imagine the surprise of their parents when told that their sons weren't coming home that night because they had "dropped everything", literally, to go & follow Jesus! Mixed emotions must have surfaced immediately, in a similar fashion to that of a generation or two ago, when parents tried to cope with the sudden departure of their son(s) who eagerly signed up to go to war.

On face value, Jesus certainly does not appear to be a good planner! His choices included a hated Tax Collector, a freedom fighter, another who had taken to the study of the Torah & another who will later turn traitor, BUT, by preaching the reign of God, forgiveness, love & victory over sin, what he accomplished with these disciples is beyond imagining.

Jesus believed in a cause, the cause of his Heavenly Father. He was totally committed to it-to preach the reign of God - the reign of forgiveness, love, & victory over sin & the evil one. He was passionate about his work, but he didn't feel that he must do everything ALONE, so, after choosing his disciples, he proceeded to train them in HIS ways. He shared his vision & enthusiasm with them, worked on their weaknesses, understood & accepted their faults, & when the time was right he entrusted them with his own mission by reassuring them that they would succeed, simply because it was not theirs, but his & and GOD'S vision! Jesus believed in the simple folk he had called; he gave them a vision larger than themselves & turned their simplicity & poverty into STRENGTH. After his mission on earth ended, the disciples went out to many parts of the world & preached the Good News about Jesus, the promised Messiah. Christianity spread to the THEN

Known world, even to the "last born" of the disciples, Paul, who had been actively persecuting the believers! Miracles do happen!

In EVERY AGE, the people of God must show Christ in all his fullness. So, right now, guess what? its our turn! WE are called to continue his work, to try our best to imitate what he did for 30 years as the Carpenter's son & up to the end of his life on earth. Luckily, we don't have to imitate Moses & set up "a burnt sacrifice" each day!! We have been given the great gift of the Holy Spirit, dwelling within us, to guide & sustain us for this work.

So, let us carry the fire of God's love through our world for another year. The truth is, our most valuable resource is in each other!

Welcome to St John Vianney Parish, anyone visiting the Lake Macquarie Region during the Summer School Holidays.

Australia Day

Next Thursday 26th January, we will be celebrating Australia Day.

As Christian Australians, we can both celebrate the good things we love about our nation, as well as recognise the wounds that need to be healed in the land and its people. Let us remember that right from the start, the full title of our land was bound up with the Holy Spirit.

For thousands of years the Aboriginal people have listened to the mystery of God, in and through their culture.

The great Portuguese explorers of the 16th Century, set out on a quest for *'Terra Australia del Espiritu Santo'*, South Land of the Holy Spirit. We have a beautiful country and there is no doubt about the work that God has given you and me, the Church, to do.

It is time for us to grieve with our Indigenous brothers and sisters who are often left disadvantaged in so many ways. We should also acknowledge the ancient wisdom of their culture that values its relationship with the natural world, a culture that is tied to the care of the land and its flora and fauna.

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER.

On the first Friday in March each year, people in over 170 countries, join in a service prepared by of a different country, to celebrate both unity in Christ and our diversity in culture. World Day of Prayer this year is Friday 3rd March. The host country for 2023 is Taiwan.

CATHOLIC CUSTOMS AND TRADITIONS.

Lent. The whole church goes on retreat for six weeks, about a month and a half after the Christmas season. It prepares for Easter and new life.

Ash Wednesday officially begins Lent. (This year **22ND February**). While the emphasis today is on voluntary Lenten practices, direction still comes from the historical evolution of Lent with its emphasis on baptism, personal conversion, penance and the suffering and death of Jesus. A rather severe Lenten discipline of fasting and abstinence remained in force until 1966. The emphasis today is on positive aspects of discipline and good works.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I appeal to you, my brothers and sisters, make up the differences between you.

I appeal to you, brothers, for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ, to make up the differences between you, and instead of disagreeing among yourselves, to be united again in your belief and practice. From what Chloe's people have been telling me, my dear brothers, it is clear that there are serious differences among you. What I mean are all these slogans that you have, like: 'I am for Paul', 'I am for Apollos', 'I am for Cephas', 'I am for Christ'. Has Christ been parcelled out? Was it Paul that was crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul?

For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed.

He went to Capernaum, that the prophecy of Isaiah be fulfilled. Hearing that John had been arrested Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. In this way the prophecy of Isaiah was to be fulfilled:

Land of Zebulun! Land of Naphtali!
Way of the sea on the far side of Jordan,
Galilee of the nations!
The people that lived in darkness
has seen a great light;
on those who dwell in the land and shadow of death
a light has dawned.

From that moment Jesus began his preaching with the message, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee he saw two brothers, Simon, who was called Peter, and his brother Andrew; they were making a cast in the lake with their net, for they were fishermen. And he said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.' And they left their nets at once and followed him.

Going on from there he saw another pair of brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they were in their boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. At once, leaving the boat and their father, they followed him.

He went round the whole of Galilee teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of the kingdom and curing all kinds of diseases and sickness among the people.

How Church Communities Can Confront Violence and Abuse



• **Listen to, support, and believe** those who are experiencing violence and abuse.



 Speak out about the sinfulness of family and domestic violence and the responsibility of perpetrators to change.



• **Publicise the support** available in your area for victim-survivors and for perpetrators who want to change their behaviour.



Reflect together on how we might be caught up in structural and cultural violence.



 Reject spiritual abuse by debunking the misuse of faith sources to justify violence, abusive behaviour or to coerce women to stay in unsafe situations.



• Connect with programs, ensuring our responses are evidence-based and trauma-informed.



Promote resources on responding to family and domestic violence produced by dioceses e.g. Perth, Broken Bay and Parramatta.
