In the Gospel for the 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Jesus asks his disciples: "Who do you say that I am?" Christianity is not a theory to be studied, but a way of life. Following Jesus begins in renouncing whatever is contrary to his wav.

Taking up the cross means a converted life, dedicated to Christian principles and virtues.

This Sunday, we the Church of Maitland-Newcastle, by decree of Bishop Bill, have nominated today as "Perpetual Day of Remembrance Sunday" ,which has its own readings. This is when we remember the harm caused by our history of child sexual abuse in our Diocese.

Today, there is a sense of diminishment in terms of the Church's moral stature in society, and there is precious little trust left in Church leaders after the Royal Commission.

This is not a time for defensiveness or despair. Rather, it must be a time of humility that we must seek to rebuild and renew . We do this by reclaiming not the former prestige and affluence, but the essential quality for Christian living and witness.

We must make the cross of Christ, living the discipleship of powerlessness and vulnerable trust, the cornerstone of the Church again.

Only then, can our voice be credible,

REFLECTION: 12 SEPTEMBER,2021- PERPETUAL DAY OF RE-MEMBRANCE

Today has been officially designated as the Perpetual Day of Remembrance in our Diocese, acknowledging our sad history of abuse and the trauma inflicted on so many children. It is important that we do acknowledge the past, it is real and it was, and is still, painful for many people. However, as important as it is to acknowledge, it is also important that we look ahead and ensure that we challenge any signs of abuse, today, in this time and place. Abuse can be subtle e.g. disrespect, silence, judgement, privilege. These are the dry bones we heard this morning, which produce death of soul, self confidence and even communities. Our readings today, highlight that we cannot live in "dry bones". Our victims/survivors also cannot live in that space forever. Somewhere there has to be a conversion or change of heart in us, a change that is ground for hope of a different and indeed safer future for everyone, including adults.

Poor old Ezekiel was placed. by God in the valley of dry bones and asked to prophesy. He did not create the bones, but was made to reflect on them. Our readings today bring us through the Valley of bones, acknowledge that we are all connected and that our lives and actions influence others, including our Church. Our Gospel, the Magnificat is a wonderful and joyous counter to the dry bones. This proclamation connects us all in the today, and tomorrow. We are all "Thirsting for the living God", we are all reaching out beyond the dichotomies of perpetrator and victim/survivor, past and present, me/us and them. Today we are all challenged to change our heart. To grow beyond past horrors and blindness, to look with clarity at the now and work towards the life changing conversion, to proclaim the greatness of God here and now. That we let the Light of Christ shine in our days and nights, bringing hope. That like Mary and Ezekiel we can say "Yes" to God. That we become what God created us to be. We remember- we grieve- we hope!

PERPETUAL REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

This Sunday 12th September, we celebrate Perpetual Day of Remembrance Sunday, established by Bishop Bill, to remember the harm and past failings within our Diocese, and to protect children from sexual abuse. This is an occasion for us to stand in solidarity with survivors who continue to suffer, and together be a sign of hope, committing to ensure that the past is never repeated and that the Church will be a safe place for all into the future.

As you are aware the Premier has announced that our Region will continue to remain in lockdown. This also means that our church will remain closed for some time, and unable to celebrate, 'face to face' the Perpetual Day of Remembrance, this Sunday.

Because it is Perpetual Remembrance Sunday it has been brought to our attention the need for people to observe this day.

To honour this request, a local virtual liturgy, is being planned for 9.30am this Sunday. This means that those who are able, can join this liturgy on their computers, or other devices, and by following the instructions.

This year we invite you during this season to connect with nature through reflection on scripture and Catholic tradition. This helps us to grow within ourselves a commitment to action. You are invited to access 7 Days of Creation Scriptural Prayers and Reflection. Over 7 days this resource offers points for reflection and prayers based on Scripture. We remind ourselves of the ongoing creative actions of God in loving kindness shown in the first twelve chapter of Genesis. This year we see direct links between the Season of Creation, the 2021-2022 Social Justice Statement, Cry of the Earth, Cry of the poor, which both include a link to the Laudato si Action Platform.

The Season of Creation theme for 2021 is A Home for all? Renewing the Oikos of God. Oikos is the Greek word for "home," or "household." By rooting the theme in the concept of oikos, we celebrate the integral web of relationships that sustain the well-being of the Earth. This year's symbol, Abraham's tent, signifies our commitment to safeguard a place for all who share our common home, just as Abraham did in the Book of Genesis.

In the Social Justice Statement, Cry of the Earth, Cry of the poor, Pope Francis reminds us that encounter, dialogue, and listening with an open heart enable God's transforming love to move more powerfully in the world. Yet when faced with complex interrelated crises – the pandemic, the ecological crisis, the economic crisis, hunger, threats to peace and security, we can find ourselves overwhelmed by information or bogged down in disagreements about details. In the statement we hear the true stories of people's experience, look at reality through the eyes of those most affected, and listen with an open heart to the stories that they tell. Our task is to listen to people, to the earth, and to all of God's creation, since every created thing is interconnected, speaks of the wellbeing of each part and of the whole, and reveals something of the Creator

It is important throughout the whole year that we welcome the stranger, show hospitality, listen to our neighbour, assist in crisis and show care for creation. The Laudato si Action Platform presents a guideline

of how we can do these things, it is our responsibility to learn and to be formed so how we live our life is a reflection of God's plan.

There are several events which you are encouraged to attend.

Season of Creation Celebration:

We can learn more about this year's Season of Creation theme from Father Anthony Coloma (Assistant Priest, The Catholic Parishes of Branxton, Greta and Singleton), Louise Campbell (Aboriginal Educational Officer), John Sandy (Multicultural family support worker) and Mary-Anne DeLuca (Mission and Outreach officer).

We will also view the creations from the finalists of the film competition and the winner will be announced at this event.

Sowing the seeds for success

With the Australian dream of living on a quarter acre block increasingly out of reach for many, unfortunately few of us have the space to fully indulge our horticultural ambitions.

Thankfully, community gardens are bridging the gap between our collective love of gardening and lack of land.

Community gardens are flourishing across the country, there's nearly 20 in the Hunter-Manning region alone! These shared spaces are a wonderful opportunity to cultivate green spaces in urban areas, meet new friends, and get in touch with mother nature.

The latest addition to the crop is CatholicCare's Taree Community Garden, which operates out of the grounds of the town's PCYC. Volunteer coordinator, Michelle Robinson, explained that CatholicCare jumped at the opportunity to get involved in the community gardens and further the great work of the Taree Community Garden group, who first established the space.

"CatholicCare was looking for ways it could build upon the success of our Community Kitchen and family services, so expanding into community gardens seemed like the natural next step," she said.

"We're looking at utilising the community garden in a few ways. The Taree Community Kitchen serves about 50 meals per day, so we're constantly relying on food donations from local businesses. Now, we will use the produce grown at the Community Garden to contribute to our meals and feed those in need."

The work of any community garden isn't possible without a team of hardworking volunteers who aren't afraid to get their hands dirty. In addition to supplying the Taree Community Kitchen with produce, volunteers will also be able to take home what they grow!

In August 2021, the Commonwealth Government released its first Closing the Gap Implementation Plan. The \$1bn Implementation Plan provides an overview of the Commonwealth's existing actions that contribute to Closing the Gap, as well as new investment and areas of future work. It is a whole-of-government plan, developed across the Commonwealth in consultation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander partners.

The National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) is the peak advisory body to the Australian Catholic Bishops on issues relating to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholics. NATSICC has provided an in-depth response to this Implementation Plan, with these reforms being described as a "glimpse of a new approach that acknowledges and utilises the knowledge and expertise of Australia's First Peoples – Australia's first scientists and diplomats and custodians of the world's oldest continuing culture."

The Catholic Social Justice Principle of Subsidiarity teaches us that all people have the right to participate in decisions that affect their lives. Subsidiarity requires that decisions be made by the people closest and most affected by the issues and concerns of the community. For many years NATSICC has called for the Catholic Social Teaching of Subsidiarity to be employed, not only in relation to the Closing the Gap Policy, but in all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Policy. In its response to the August update, NATSICC has called for increased empowerment and funding of locally run Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations, as well as urgent policy based changes to address the widening chasms between First Nations and non-Indigenous Peoples.

Summary of the NATSICC Response:

- The Government's renewed focus on developing partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Organisations in reaching the new targets is appropriate;
- We welcome the Stolen Generations Redress Scheme for the ACT, NT and Jervis Bay territory in NSW, but call for QLD and WA to introduce similar Schemes as a matter of urgency;
- Longer term funding arrangements would empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander led Organisations to create long term plans and develop Programs with greater lifespans;
- The age of criminal responsibility must be raised to 14 years of age;
- Government should move away from 'deficit' language when describing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Communities;
- NATSICC calls on the Government to adopt the key pillars of the Uluru Statement Truth Telling, a
 Voice to Parliament and Constitutional Reform; and
- The education of mainstream Australia to the cultural gifts and genuine need of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples is imperative to Closing the Gap.
