Dear Parish Family,

Your faith has saved you....

It's interesting that this weekend we have the stories around leprosy. During my recent holiday, we visited and were told stories about the lepers in Glasgow, Scotland. Across the river, away from the main town, was a building called The Gorbals where lepers were sent. We heard stories that it was overcrowded and generous people, possible family would often leave food and clothing at the end of the bridge for them to collect. If you had leprosy, you were not to cross the bridge. There were some sad stories about people dying and their fellow lepers would bury them. Some years later a priest went in and blessed the cemetery. This only happened less than fifty years ago.

Lepers appear many times in the Bible. Leprosy now known as Hansen's disease stripped a person of all their self-esteem. Considered highly contagious, it covered many skin disfigurements and was so feared, that the laws segregated the leper from all parts of life – you were an outcast of society; forbidden to attend the synagogue; banished from your family and friends and the township - your only companionship was found in other lepers. Such was the fear that a leper was forced to wear a bell around their neck to warn people. Then, after years of being alienated and neglected, death was a lonely event. So here were people without any rights, without any dignity, without any hope. So to be cured of leprosy involved more than just physical healing but one's whole life restored to possibility again

From this hopeless situation these lepers encounter the prophet Elisha and Jesus. Naaman who is not Jewish is healed through the prophet and the ten lepers probably also not Jewish, are healed through Jesus. After healing come gratitude and praise. Both Naaman and the lone Samaritan are filled with gratitude to the one responsible for their healing. They are not so preoccupied with their good fortune as to forget that it came to them as a gift. Who are those modern-day lepers around us today? People who do not look and sound like us; people suffering from mental health; the homeless; the sick and the lonely – the lepers remind us that the Kingdom of God is for all....we have no exclusive rights, but we are invited to be part of.

This week I was advised by Bishop Michael that Fr Raphael will be taking up a new appointment as Assistant Priest of the Parish of Cessnock starting Thursday 30th October 2025. Having lived with Fr Raphael at Toronto and worked alongside him, I am sad to see him moving on. I won't say too much now, but we have been blessed with his ministry and his prayerful presence. Fr Raphael will say his last Masses in the parishes the weekend of the 1st/2nd November. A farewell collection at the end of Mass will be taken up next weekend 18th/19th October, if you would like to donate. I expect that each community will celebrate Fr Raphael in their own way, but I invite all parishioners throughout the parishes to his farewell from all of us:

The man told his doctor that he couldn't do all the things around the house that he used to do.

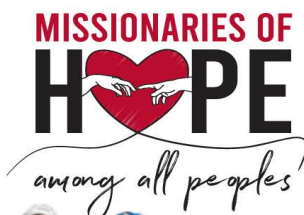

LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS 5 October 2025

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. During school holidays, there may be more opportunities for **children playing games online**, supervised and unsupervised.

Gaming benefits. Gaming can be a way to:

- have fun, be entertained, relax and reduce stress, connect with others
- keep the mind active and develop creativity, strengthen decision making and strategic skills
- view general school education programs, competitive eSports and possible workplace training (e.g. flight simulations).

Gaming risks. Risks include:

- cyberbullying (for example threats, verbal abuse, ganging up, exclusion)
- inappropriate language, age-inappropriate content, or access to pornography
- unwanted contact from others, including 'grooming' by sexual predators
- themes or elements that may encourage young people to gamble now or later
- giving out too much personal data and spending too much time online.

Regulate online time. If gaming is balanced with other activities and sleep, there is usually no need for concern. If gaming starts to have negative impacts on your child or your family, parents and carers may need to regulate their time online. Gaming disorder has now been recognised by World Health Organisation as a mental health condition and there are practitioners who specialise in internet overuse problems.

2025 NATSICC CONFERENCE – PILGRIMS OF HOPE

Last week, representatives from the Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle joined almost 300 delegates from across the country at the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) Assembly.

Guided by the Jubilee theme Pilgrims of Hope, the gathering was a powerful time of prayer, truth-telling, cultural exchange and reflection. The delegates experienced many highlights throughout the assembly. On the opening day, students from St Paul's Catholic College, Booragul, gave a moving performance that set the tone for the days ahead. On Wednesday, our delegates had the privilege of connecting with history and culture through On Country experiences at Baiame Cave, Nobbys Head, and the Murrook Culture Centre. And, on Thursday, Australian journalist Stan Grant delivered an inspiring keynote to the assembly and delegates experienced a powerful youth liturgy. These moments offered a chance to deepen understanding and build meaningful connections with First Nations spirituality and story. Fr Darryl Mackie, Parish Priest of Boolaroo, Booragul, Toronto and Morisset, said the conference was an amazing opportunity to connect with others. "I

think we have been trying to explore things a bit more over the last few days about Aboriginal spirituality and my understanding is that it just co exists so well with our Christian spirituality," he said. "[We have] gone through some dark periods of time together but the future is looking bigger and brighter. "Pope John Paul II said, almost forty years ago now, that Aboriginal spirituality should be part of the church and until we start to celebrate that and combine it into our church then we won't be the church that Jesus is calling us to be." Fr Darryl added he is proud of the Diocese for playing a big role in the event and congratulated everyone involved for their hard work. "I think it has been great that the Diocese has hosted this year, it has highlighted the beauty of our Diocese, not just the land, the country and the waterways but also our people," he said.

Now, please, accept a present from your servant.' But Elisha replied, 'As the Lord lives, whom I serve, I will accept nothing.' Naaman pressed him to accept, but he refused. Then Naaman said, 'Since your answer is "No," allow your servant to be given as much earth as two mules may carry, because your servant will no longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any god except the Lord.'

They stood some way off and called to him, 'Jesus! Master! Take pity on us.' When he saw them he said, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' Now as they were going away they were cleansed. Finding himself cured, one of them turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan. This made Jesus say, 'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'
