### REFLECTION FOR 29<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - 16<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER 2022

In todays Gospel Jesus said to his disciples, 'Pray continually and never lose heart.

Prayer and faith are very closely connected. It is because we have faith that we pray. At the same time prayer sustains our faith. St. Augustine's description of prayer affirms prayer, as an expression of our faith and trust in God.

The readings this Sunday, speak of the commitment to prayer and relationship with God, which is the basis for our lives of faith, hope and love These readings don't simply teach us to pray for what we need, but highlight the fundamental element of Christian life, which is the grounding of our identity, and the nurturing of our mission.

We may ask, 'How do we pray amidst the noise and clamour of modern life'. We are told that prayer is the answer, but what is prayer, that makes it the answer?

Prayer is not a performance, and something we worry about that is the 'correct fit'. We Catholics in Australia are often hindered by thinking, that because there's a technique for success, there must be a winning technique for prayer. It may help to know that we don't need, sophisticated words or lofty arguments to pray. The God of mercy does hear us. The challenge is to be open to God's answer.

A widely circulated story about Thomas Edison says that when he was refining the light bulb, he failed 1,000 (sometimes the story goes 10,000) times before he found a long-lasting filament. Whatever the exact number of trials he conducted, the point remains that Edison persisted for a long, long time before he and his team finally hit upon the ingredients that made the light bulb commercially successful.

We live in a time of change, diminishment, and uncertainty. Ours is not a time for activism, cynicism, or nostalgia. It is a time for deepening of our commitment, for grounding our identity, and nurturing our mission. Its not easy to maintain one's calm in a restless, unhappy world gone mad with constant upheaval.

The final line of this week's Gospel might prompt some challenging reflection: "But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?

For most of us it will mean living our lives here in such a way that we will attract others to want to know what it is that inspires our life. For all of us it means building a vibrant, prayerful, faithfilled, and welcoming community, a spiritual home for those searching for a place where their souls can find peace, and. a Church that is more aligned to the radical vision of Christ.

This Sunday, Jesus is calling us to get our priorities straight. He

is calling us to speak out and do something real and concrete about injustice and human dignity and is challenging us to sacrifice our complacency for the sake of our fellow pilgrims.

Cluster Commander for the Hunter SES, Graeme Silver was thrilled to speak at the event.

He shared stories from the frontline in his SES role and from when he worked with NSW Ambulance.

"I am a retired paramedic, so I have had experience with mental health patients and also mental ill-health within the ambulance service and my colleagues," he said.

"My piece of advice is to seek help as soon as you can."

He also encouraged people to connect with others and check in on their mates.



A reading from the book of Exodus

#### As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage.

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the

advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy

#### This is how the people of God become equipped and ready for every good work.

You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures — from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death.""

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'
