Dear Parish Family,

We are one in the Spirit; we are one in the Lord. And they'll know we are Christians by our love!

This hymn is an oldie but a "goodie" most of us would remember! When I worked in hospital chaplaincy, I was always amazed at the number of people each year who requested as adults to be baptised as Catholics or to be received into the Church. There were seven in my first year and then a number each subsequent year. Not all were going to meet their maker soon. I asked them what drew you to this journey in your faith? To which many answered - it was being surrounded by people of faith, the caring, the kindness and most of all the love was what they experienced. These were parents watching a child being nursed into care; a partner held as they were dying or in their own illness, they saw something special that they wanted to be part of.

Love is what distinguishes the Christian from other faith traditions. The Jewish faith is often perceived as holding obedience to the Law or the ten commandments and upholding culture and practice. Islam is about complete submission to the will of God with a strong emphasis on peace and living as a way of life as per the teachings of the Quran. In the Gospel, Jesus calls the "new" commandment to love after washing the feet of his disciples. Not hands but feet - an intimate part of our body; they're ticklish; they show our wear and tear; and toes/feet come in all shapes and sizes. So does love, it comes in all shapes and sizes and asks a lot of us. Sometimes it's hard enough to love those who are like us; how can we possibly love those who are different? And how can we love those who do not love us? It is no wonder Jesus called it new. It calls for something completely different but they'll know we are Christians by our love.... a world full of love is John's vision of a new heaven and a new earth.

A few people have asked me what do I think of the new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV. Well, the Holy Spirit has discerned through the Cardinals that we need someone who is missionary and a diplomat. The Church's call to mission is greater now than ever to take up the call to be the good news to all whom we encounter. We are also living in a troubled world that continues to search for peace, as a diplomat, the Holy Father as the Pontifex or bridge builder will be there seeking peace between nations.

As for the choice of name, Pope Leo XIII, who lived at the turn of the twentieth century was revolutionary around social justice and the workforce which led to reforms within the Church that has guided us since. The Pope said he chose the name because the world needs to face a new revolution, artificial intelligence (AI). He would be pleased with a show I watched this week on AI. The question was asked: "if someone was born today what religion would be best to choose?" The answer came out:

Christianity because it has a God who is loving and forgiving and encourages the caring of each other. Maybe AI is not that bad after all.

Come, Holy Spirit; fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love.

Talking about the Holy Spirit guiding the Church....in just a few weeks' time we will be celebrating Pentecost – the day when we celebrate the many gifts that are given to each and every one of us, to enrich the Church. On that Sunday, we will have a Gifting Sunday where we will be asking for volunteers to help and support the various ministries within our parishes. Have you ever thought about being a reader at Mass, or assisting with Children's Liturgies, or maybe assisting in helping with the reading programs at one of our schools...there are many more ministries that we need help with....

They assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.
