



THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR B SUNDAY 07 MARCH, 2021

We are now in the middle of Lent, our unique retreat time. For Forty days, the entire church, from the greatest to the least, is called to take a look at how our life reflects what we believe about God. Today the Gospel tells the story of Jesus' touching encounter with a Samaritan woman.

The two sit, talk and listen to one another. Through their mutual acceptance of the other, the walls, boundaries, hostilities and hatreds, which had long separated Samaritans and Jews, melt away and disappear. Jesus didn't force himself into her life. He treated her with great respect. Not a hint of judgment or condemnation. Rather she felt accepted and understood.

During this season of Lent, as we go forward in living our lives, let us strive to be more like Jesus. Let us spend some time to remember the day of our baptism, and sit like the woman at the well. Let us reflect on the transformation of this woman. Let us remember that our faith is based on a personal encounter with Christ, the one whose effect on us is like cascading water.

We Acknowledge the traditional owners of this land the Awabakal Peoples. And pay our respects to the elders past and present, and any that may be with us today.

SEE JUDGE ACT

METHOD OF THE YCW (YOUNG CHRISTIAN WORKERS)

See, Judge Act is a simple format. It was developed for small groups of Christian youth. They would meet and consider how they could express their Faith in Christ in their workplace. The goal was to improve their workplace situation by some suitable decision or course of action. The action really aimed to do what they thought Jesus would do. See Judge Act was a means of helping to live ones Faith in the workplace-especially in service of promoting justice, and goodwill.



YCW has been in various parts of the world Church for perhaps 80 years. It has a youth branch called Young Christian Students (YCS). Our Diocese has employed a young woman Ailis McPherson to promote the introduction of YCS in our High Schools. St Paul's Booragul is one of the first schools to look at making YCS for interested students. It would normally be a 30 minute small group meeting each week, or two.

Our parish is presently running a trial of the See Judge Act method with a small group of about 8. They are meeting for 40 minutes each month for 4 months. The format is simple. Read the Gospel of the coming Sunday Mass; read again, noting what aspect of the text captured one's attention. This is simply shared by group members.

Then participants may share how that text may something 'speak' to in their present life-experience. Sharing is optional. gathering is more a listening to each other time than a discussion time. The gathering concludes Lord's Praver and with the Hail Participants may personally be aware of how engage in some response to the shared reflection time.

A small group of teachers at St John Vianney's school are also trialling See Judge Act for 4 months.

Much of the motivation of YCW is our belief in the truth of all people's common dignity as being created by God, created in God's image and likeness as the book of Genesis says.

Please pray this Lent each day for God to bless the work which will go into making YCS available at St Paul's Booragul. Experience has proved that YCS helps young people mature and grow in their Faith in Christ.



The hope is that other parishioners will feel interested in being part of one of these simple groups, whose aim is to support the living of our Faith in our day to day actions. Please feel free to ask any questions if you would like to know more, or to join a See Judge Act group.

REFLECTION: LENT 3 "THE SAMARITAN APOSTLE"

It is not surprising that this story of the "Woman at the Well" is called a story of conversion.

This woman, one who was ostracised in her own town, held a long and rather Theological conversation with Jesus. They discussed whether he had something better than Jacob's well to offer [tradition]. They then discussed where people should really worship, [liturgy] ending with who Jesus really was [theology].

Her encounter with Jesus was extra-ordinary in that Jews and Samaritans, though related, were distained by the Jews as backwoods idolators who had intermarried with people from outside and had become outsiders themselves. So Jesus asking her for a drink had huge implications.

They spoke for a long time, but what really counted with her was that Jesus revealed himself as the Messiah. He revealed himself to Her!

We don't know what else was said, but what stuck with her was that "He told me everything I have done." She had been accepted for everything she was. That fulfilled a need that no affair could ever satisfy.

This story is about thirst, about God seeking and finding beloved humanity. Whatever her social status was, town reject or the "In" person, she became an apostle and an evangeliser. In Evangelii Gaudium (The Joy of The Gospel), Pope Francis writes that, "Every Christian is a missionary to the extent that he or she has encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus." That was what happened with the Samaritan woman. All of the theological discussion, their differences and traditions are of no matter in the face of an encounter with Jesus. She was filled with the Spirit and this made her an apostle, one who enticed others into a similar encounter with him

On this Sunday in Lent we are offered this story and invited to reflect on the transformation of this woman. It reminds us that our faith is based on a personal encounter with Christ, the one whose effect on us is like cascading water; Water bubbling, filling us with the joyful expression that we are loved just as we are.

The conversion here is about focusing on Jesus and God's love, nothing more and nothing less.

We are loved, so we must also love.

But just one thought: did she ever give Jesus that drink of water? Uta

While the Jews demand miracles and the Greeks look for wisdom, here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over, to the pagans madness, but to those who have been called, whether they are Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The water that I shall give will turn into a spring of eternal life.

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give me a drink, you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water

will get thirsty again: but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman, 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. I see you are a prophet, sir. Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know; for salvation comes from the Jews.

But the hour will come – in fact it is here already – when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth: that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants.

God is spirit, and those who worship must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony, so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world.'

Q. How are we able to come 'face to face' with Jesus today as did the woman at the well?
