REFLECTION FOR THE 28th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

I was reading an article the other day from Dick Folger, he was reminiscing about a television spectator sport called "Texas Hold-Em".

I was a bit befuddled what he meant, but, as it turned out it is the World Series Poker competition and you need \$1 million dollars to buy into the game. In 2012 the winner walked away with \$18,346,000.00. If he banked it, he could take out \$1,000 a day for over 50 years before he ran out.

I was still puzzled when he continued that if a player thinks he holds a winning hand he can bet all his chips. This move is called "going all-in", it forces all other players to match the bet or fold their hands.

Then the penny dropped for me. In the Gospel this week Jesus was confronted by a young man. He was a good man, always trying to do what was right but he balked at the last hurdle.

Basically Jesus invited him to go and seek all he owned, give it to the poor and then follow him.

This was a step too far for the young man and in a sense he folded his hand and left the game.

The stakes were high- he wanted eternal life- but he could not let go of his security.

This does not make him bad, we all have things we cling to as security, not just money.

These things possess us- not us possessing them! We will do anything to keep whatever it is that possesses us.

In Pope Francis' writings, he is challenging me to learn from this Gospel story. He is challenging me to see if there is anything that possesses me in my life. What can't I let go of at any cost?

He says that if I can't, then I will never see the person who has to do without everything, and who needs my companionship and help. My clinging on to something at any cost, blinds me to everything and everyone else around me. My only mission is to cling onto what is mine.

The Bible does not say that money is the root of all evil, but it does say that the "love of Money' is the root of all evil. It is not what we have but it is what we do with it that counts.

Just as the young man was challenged to "go all-in" to achieve the prize, you and I are challenged to let go, to "go all-in" and change our focus from ourselves and look to God.

Jesus says, "For human beings, it is impossible but all things are possible for God".

Every challenge, every demand Jesus made on his disciples, and on us, becomes possible if we learn to rely on God's grace and approach each challenge as an opportunity to respond to God's call.

I pray that you and I can accept the challenge, look within ourselves, and see what is our stumbling block is that is keeping us from "going all-in" and accept God's challenge to become more!

ADVICE FROM THE DIOCESE ON RE-OPENING

You have probably heard this past week about the NSW Government's roadmap to reopening of the State. Late on Friday last week we received this advice from Fr Andrew Doohan Vicar General. I will mention very briefly what it will mean for Places of Worship.

There are essentially three phases to the NSW Government's roadmap, and the reopening of churches in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle will be staged to match those phases

PHASE ONE: reopening commences when 70% of eligible people are fully vaccinated. It is estimated that this milestone should be reached by 11 October

We would then be entitled to reopen our churches at this point, but only to those who are fully vaccinated.

For that reason, it has been decided not to reopen at 70%, but to await the next milestone at 80%, before we reopen our churches to the public, and for the celebration of Mass.

The state expects to reach 80% fully vaccinated, around the end of October.


We will keep you informed as the month progresses, of what it will mean for us here at Morisset.

A voice for youth: Plenary Council's youngest member looks ahead to historic gathering

A quietly-spoken 20-year-old university student and youth minister from the regional New South Wales city of Orange is

set to make history as the youngest member of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia. **GUEST CONTRIBUTION** PUBLISHED OCTOBER 01, 2021

Matthew Brown is currently in the first year of a double law and international studies degree at the University of Wollongong, but has returned to his home town to prepare for what he believes will be perhaps the greatest challenge he has faced so far in his young life.

A proud graduate of James Sheahan Catholic High School in Orange, Mr Brown received a surprising phone call from the Diocese of Bathurst last year, inviting him to become one of only five members on the Plenary Council from his rural diocese, including Bishop Michael McKenna.

"I was school captain in my final year and loved my time there so much that I decided to take up a position as a youth minister in my gap year. It wasn't long into my time in that role that I received the call from the Diocese", he explained.

"I was a little hesitant at first because I didn't really appreciate what a plenary council entailed. But after some discernment, I knew this was such a landmark event for the future of the Catholic Church in Australia and such a great opportunity for youth to be represented".

Mr Brown attributes his strong Catholic faith and commitment to serving the community to his education at James Sheahan High, where he was heavily influenced by its dual charism of the De La Salle Brothers and the Mercy Sisters.

"A real turning point for me came in year 11 when I volunteered for an immersion trip to the northern Sri Lankan city of Mannar, where I spent a week alongside my classmates teaching at a Lasallian school there", he said.

"I had spent a year fundraising for the trip and it was so rewarding seeing the impact that had as students benefited from having new computers and iPads thanks to the fundraising we had been involved with in Orange."

Mr Brown said he wants to build upon that spirit of serving those in greatest need through the Plenary Council – the first such event in Australia in more than 80 years.

"I really want to see a Church more open to serving the marginalised, especially Indigenous Australians who have such a beautiful spirituality we can learn from," he said.

"I also feel very much called to be a genuine voice for youth at the Plenary Council. I believe our young Catholics really want to see our Church heal from its dark past, especially around its history of clerical abuse where there is a real need for greater accountability.

"In the interests of future generations, we need to move forward and build up a Church which is committed to a greater future."

Plans to hold an in-person gathering of 280 members of the Council's first assembly in Adelaide from October 3-10 have been abandoned and replaced with each member now participating in the assembly from their own homes. In some regions not affected by COVID-19 at that time, members might gather in small groups.

Mr Brown said he has been undertaking his university studies largely online since the pandemic began and he is therefore very much at home as the Plenary Council shifts towards largely online delivery.

"While I was very much looking forward to meeting and socialising with other members in person, I'm very used to working online," he explained.

"But certainly, depending upon the COVID restrictions in place by October, there may still hopefully be a way that we can gather in a Diocese of Bathurst hub, given our relatively small numbers."

Over recent months, Mr Brown has been speaking about the Plenary Council at local youth festivals, helping to encourage other young Catholics to engage with this historic event.

"Youth ministry has really helped provide me with the skill set to step into this important role and I'm really looking forward to engaging with fellow Plenary Council members to serve our Church in such a special way," he said.

What God has joined together, no one must divide.

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.
