Today's readings focus on leprosy, but they could be about any disease or injustice and the judgement that can accompany the condition. Sometimes an illness is considered socially unacceptable and those afflicted cannot escape the condition that evokes fear, alienation or condemnation.

In Jesus' time, lepers were outcasts. Mandatory separation from nearly everyone was probably worse than the disease itself. It wasn't the lepers' fault; they simply had come in contact with a bacterium many centuries before antibiotics. No doubt some people increased the misery of lepers with taunting and name-calling.

Mark tells us Jesus reacts with compassion from deep within himself. The fear of ritual impurity does not stop him. The barriers and divisions do not hold for Jesus. His touch heals.

Its amazing what people can do for others, even when they mirror dimly the infinite charity of God. People can rekindle hope, bring back the zest for living, inspire plans for the future, restore self respect and pride.

We Acknowledge the traditional owners of this land the Awabakal Peoples. And pay our respects to the elders past and present, and any that may be with us today.

REFLECTION 6TH SUNDAY O/T YEAR B 14 FEB 2021

Perhaps at some time in our lives many of us have known the pain of being excluded, shut off or cut off from social contacts & have felt the hurt deep inside. As humans, the wish to belong is one of our most powerful human desires---alone we can wither & die , so it's not surprising that "belonging" is a central theme in our Scriptures. It is also a vivid feature in the ministry of Jesus as He is constantly welcoming, inclusive & hospitable.

In the 1st Reading, 2 lengthy chapters from Leviticus are devoted to the issue of skin diseases (generally but misleadingly called "leprosy"). It was regarded as one of the greatest forms of uncleanliness & seen as a physical manifestation of God's punishment on the person. Lepers were forced to live outside their village for fear of contamination & they were expected to call out a warning "unclean, unclean" if anyone came near them. Being unable to work, they were forced to beg for food & money so were literally on the very edge of society.

For a person like this to even approach Jesus was a huge risk but also an enormous act of faith! He TRUSTS that Jesus will not reject him as everybody else has done in his life -- his request is almost a demand- it is filled with an utter conviction of Jesus' ability & goodwill as he says " If you want to, you can cure me"! Jesus' reaction is equally emotional as he is moved by this man's plight. By reaching out his hand & touching the man , he breaks every rule of the purity code of Jewish society & so would be considered unclean himself! Still he is not deterred, but responds with LOVE & heals the leper with word & action -but instructs him to conform to the Jewish rules that will enable him to return to worship & back into everyday life.

Jesus' reaction is a fully HUMAN one of indignation at what this man is forced to endure & is a gut-wrenching response from the very core of his HUMANITY.

There is a story of Francis of Assisi in which he encountered a horribly disfigured leper.

Initially, he was repulsed by the man but remembered that this man, too, was a child of God & overcoming his fears, he ran forward & embraced him.

Rather than seeing the DISEASE, Francis saw the PERSON.

In our present day society of a "winner takes all" culture, everyone loses, especially those we label as "frail" or "an outcast ", like the leper. But eventually, of course, ALL of us become frail & the last thing we want is a society made up of hard-hearted people who resent having to help others - the truth is, however, that our most valuable resource lies in each other. It doesn't cost anything to brighten up someone's day.

So many lessons have been learnt during the past year as we adapted to changes & sought to help others who were struggling with the "new normal" way of life.

Pope John Paul II urged us all in 1995 to be a gift of love & compassion to one another- how are we doing in that regard?

As the Season of Lent approaches , our preparation for Easter, let us ask ourselves these questions---

Who is your leper? Who is the person in your life that you need to embrace, rather than reject?

Who would benefit from you viewing them with different eyes? SOFT eyes! Eyes of COMPASSION!

May we all become apostles of the open table so that ALL might feel WELCOME & INCLUDED. Heather White

PERFECT TIME TO SEEK OUR TRUTH

It seems only fitting that Bishop Bill formally convoked the Diocesan Synod of Maitland Newcastle on the feast of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop. One of the well-known sayings from Australia's first saint is "Never see a need without doing something about it".

We now have an opportunity to explore our diocesan needs through a synod at a time when our nation is conducting a Plenary Council.

It is synchronous that before Mary MacKillop's canonisation, now 11 years ago, Australia recognised August 8 as the feast day of St Dominic de Guzman, the founder of the Dominican order whose motto "Veritas", which means truth.

As we journey towards the second session of synod in May 2021, we can focus on these two concepts – what is our truth, and what are our needs and what can we do about them?

Active and contemplative life for many theologians, religious and lay people has been the subject of debate for centuries. Thomas Aquinas engages in a disputation in his Summa Theologiae on the active life in comparison with the contemplative life and tries to determine which is of greater value. Which of them has greater merit? Does the active life hinder the contemplative life? Does the active life precede the contemplative? Both points of view would concur that active and contemplative forms of encounter with God are equally important and needed.

Before we act, we need to think, reflect and contemplate. Deep listening within ourselves, with others and with our God not only enhances and encourages strong relationships, it reveals truth and uncovers needs.

This year during Lent we are being provided with the opportunity to stop, be still, and listen through contemplative dialogue as we break open the synod's theme of Building the Kingdom of God Together. Each week during Lent, individuals and groups, delegates and observers, will focus on one of our diocesan five foundations of Identity and Community, Worship and Prayer, Formation and Education, Mission and Outreach, and Leadership and Structure.

The resources that form part of the experience engage the Catholic imagination and invite everyone, as Pope Francis states in Evangelii Gaudium, to a "renewed personal encounter with Christ, or an openness to letting God encounter you. No one should think that this invitation is not meant for him or her, no one is excluded from the Lord's Joy."

The type of dialogue is a contemplative way of being together; a way of engaging in meaningful conversations that are rooted in deep listening. There are key questions. What resonates with you? What challenges you? What is the invitation to you personally and for your local Church community? These will be contemplated and explored through engagement with the resources and each other.

Contemplative dialogue leads to a shared understanding, as people with unique gifts, points of view and values grow in capacity and willingness to think creatively together. The practice of contemplative dialogue supports building a shared approach that is effective, practical, and better allows us to bring our best selves together and to participate in cultivating a creative common ground.

In 2019 we shared our concerns and fears, asking the big question about "What is the Spirit asking of us in Australia" We answered in 3 ways, National, Diocesan and Parish.

All our answers were collated, and the Diocesan ones came back to us and have been collated and refined. Now we will look at these concerns and reflect on them.



Our Lenten Program is a weekly process. We begin by hearing the Sunday's Gospel, listening to the reflection, we look at Our Story presented as a Visual Representation, we look at each Foundational Statement, then, we look at the Concerns and Recommendations being made.

When we come together, we share our insights with each other, we listen to each other respectfully and share our wisdom.

Kinder Surprise

Tessa Evans is as excited as every other child starting Kindergarten at St John Vianney, Morisset, but her life experiences aren't those of your average five-year-old.

Her mother Cassy Evans recalls the moment that shaped the past three years of the Lake Macquarie family's life.

"I was picking up Tessa's brother and sister from vacation care when I received a call

from our doctor who said initial test results weren't looking good and we should go to hospital for more tests," Cassy says.

The call followed Tessa falling ill 10 days before with fevers and severe lethargy. After visits to various GPs, and antibiotics, Tessa was sent for blood tests.

"We found out on a Thursday and I just thought, this is crazy," says Cassy. "Only two weeks ago we had a healthy two-year-old. She started chemo the next day."

Despite the years of leukemia treatment and different life experiences to her 23 peers in Kindergarten, Tessa shares the same emotions as she starts school.

"She is so excited," says Cassy. "I think she might get a bit nervous when it comes to walking in the gate, but she's been wearing her sister's uniform and asking for months when she will start."

Starting school is a significant milestone for any child and their family. This time brings with it hope, excitement, some nervousness, and many new experiences.

It marks the commencement of education, a beginning of new friendships, connections – a community. And the family is aware of the exceptional community that will support her and her daughter at the school.

With her older siblings attending the school over the past three years, Cassy and Tessa's father, Jonathan, have been part of that network as they navigated Tessa's diagnosis and treatment.

"They say it takes a village to raise a child," says Cassy. "We were able to call on a community – many through the school, other friends and just calling on people when I needed it. There were times when I had to phone other parents at the school and ask them to help with my older kids as we had to unexpectedly rush to hospital.

"The school is a close-knit community and I've been lucky to experience that. It's big enough that there are facilities and good extra-curricular activities but small enough that we know each other."

Jonathan says, "The support was outstanding. Even just knowing that you have support in the background and calling on it when needed, that can make all the difference."

When Tessa became sick, the school developed a care roster and different families made meals for the Evans family. This initiative is something the school does regularly for any family going through a difficult time.

"In the end, everyone was so kind and generous I ended up telling them it was OK to stop cooking," says Cassy. "The little things like this have a made a huge difference to us."

Late last year, Tessa followed the lead of her older siblings and decided to write a Christmas card to the school principal, Simon Devlin.

Mr Devlin says Tessa has always been positive and happy as part of the wider school community.

"It's an example of resilience and strength in someone so young," he says. "In fact, the whole family has been so supportive of our community. They bring a lot of energy to the school."

Such energy is reciprocated.

"There have been some lovely connections at the school and Tessa already knows her buddies," says Cassy. "The school sent out letters from the buddies and we learnt about them and this really helped in making the kids feel more welcome."

Tessa's connection to her new friends shines through.

"My buddies will play with me at lunchtime," says Tessa. "We can play in the playground. And at orientation, I got to go to my classroom. We made some things out of playdough."

With the companionship of her buddies and a bubbling confidence, Tessa will commence Kindergarten like any other child. Jonathan agrees she is counting down the days to school, looking forward to what lies ahead. "I just hope that she has fun and she really enjoys the whole journey," he says.

Cassy contemplates this new beginning – what finishing the leukemia treatment last year means for her family, and what 2021 will bring for Tessa.

"It's really just normalcy that I hope for," says Cassy. "It seems like a bizarre thing to say, and we hear about the 'new normal' a lot with Covid, but our family has been using that term for years.

"For Tessa, 2021 is about sharing 'a normal' with everyone else. Starting school, being with her friends and just being able to do things that all the other kids are doing."

The Social Justice 2020-2021 Statement, To Live Life to the Full: Mental health in Australia today, provides the opportunity to better understand mental illness and how as social beings we need the bonds of family, friends and the broader community to celebrate the joys and hopes of life.

These binds help us to face the usual challenges of life, but they are even more important in times of anxiety or despair. Our neighbourhoods, community organisations and clubs, and faith communities can be places of acceptance care and healing, rather than places of rejection, judgment or stigma.

The stigma associated with mental ill-health can be as debilitating as the symptoms of the illness. Negative stereotypes lead to people being avoided, excluded or dismissed. People with mental ill-health can be seen as incompetent and denied opportunities. Stigma undermines self-esteem, the treatment of ill-health, and the process of recovery. We need to reject the stigmatisation of mental ill-health, to challenge negative stereotypes and to eliminate discrimination.

The statement says, "our society tends to draw away from, or to push away, those who confront us with our frailties and limitations". It encourages another way of responding, inviting us to accept that we all have frailties and limitations, and to embrace "those who are sick or who have disabilities, those who are marginalised or despised". People living with mental ill-health are part of "us" and are not some "other" people. It is not a matter of "us" and "them". We all want to share in the fullness of life and live life to the full.



The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons.

'The man is leprous: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean". As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart; he must live outside the camp.'
