Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord, which is the final day of the Christmas season.

Can you remember your baptism? Not many of us can, because most of us were baptised as infants. In the early church it was adults who were baptised. Only later did it become common to baptise infants.

Baptism is not initiation into an exclusive club of rights and privileges. Baptism is initiation into Christ. We "put on Christ." That is a call and a way of life, not a membership.

At baptism we were pointed in a very specific direction. In baptism we are called to share in the life of God, and are called to love one another. God wants us to have life, life in abundance.

The ultimate question for a Christian is: Am I being true to the direction in which I was pointed at baptism?

Reflection-The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. -2022

Today we celebrate the Feast of The Baptism of the Lord. This Feast brings us to the end of the Christmas season.

The start of a New Year brings hope and excitement! An opportunity to start afresh and with a renewed focus. But, before we focus on what the new year might bring, it is often wise for us to reflect on the one we left behind.

Not everyone came through 2021 as they would have liked Our ability to hold liturgies etc was, interrupted and restricted. Thank you to the parishioners who have supported the parish with your assistance in helping us hold Mass/Liturgies, Covid safe, although in a restricted and limited capacity, to comply with NSW Health orders. The pandemic has highlighted how vulnerable and interconnected everyone is. If we do not take care of one another, starting with the least, and those who are most impacted.

In reflecting on Jesus' baptism, we are also invited to reflect on our own. Most of us remember our birthdays and celebrate them throughout the years. But how many of us even remember, the day of our baptism, when we were incorporated into the life of Christ and the Church? At baptism we were pointed in a very specific direction. Jesus, too, came to realise his calling, and he accepted it, when he stepped into the River Jordan to be baptised. He was called to give his life for others. At baptism, we, too, are called as God's own.

Christ instituted baptism as the gateway to the life of Christian discipleship. Thus, the Christian way of discipleship begins in baptism, and it is the fundamental vocation in which the Church's mission and ministry find full meaning.

Pope Francis wants us to go to the margins, to stay close to those on the edges of life and to be that Church which is bruised, hurt, and soiled, because it has been out on the streets and immersed in the coalface realities.

Today, we are challenged to embrace the path of authentic Christian discipleship based on the teaching and example of Christ. The sexual abuse crisis has highlighted a Church culture that is far from the vulnerability and powerlessness that Jesus enacted. We are a battered Church in Australia, and one that is under siege. We can easily feel overwhelmed by the challenges and the negative things around us. Nevertheless, our call is not to

go back to the known securities of the past. It is to risk new frontiers of engagement and accompaniment. We cannot regain our moral credibility without first reclaiming the innocence and powerlessness of Jesus and making it the cornerstone of all that we do and all that we are

Today as we reflect upon Jesus' Baptism, let us reflect upon our own, praying for a deeper realisation of what it means to be consecrated to God and anointed by his Spirit.

Let us also pray for those whom we have brought to the Church's baptismal font, especially if we have taken on the profound commitment of being a godparent. Let us all, whoever we are, and each in his or her own state of life, renew our commitment to carry on the mission of lesus

Lent. The whole church goes on retreat for six weeks, about a month and a half after the Christmas season. It prepares for Easter and new life.

Ash Wednesday officially begins Lent. (This year 2nd March). While the emphasis today is on voluntary Lenten practices, direction still comes from the historical evolution of Lent with its emphasis on baptism, personal conversion, penance and the suffering and death of Jesus. A rather severe Lenten discipline of fasting and abstinence remained in force until 1966. The emphasis today is on positive aspects of discipline and good works.

LITURGICAL YEAR C- THE GOSPEL OF LUKE:

The four Gospels in our Christian Scriptures all tell of the ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus.

Each Gospel has its own flavour and vision and each were written at a different time and community.

This year we are in Year C and we draw on the wisdom of the Gospel of Luke. Fr George Smiga is a nationally recognised author and lecturer in Scripture and Homiletics and he poses that there are three main themes in the Gospel of Luke.

From Luke's perspective they are: WORLD-AFFIRMATION, WEALTH AND THE SALVATION OF THE POOR.

WORLD-AFFIRMATION:

Throughout history, and even today, Christians have adopted various attitudes to the world that we live in. The reality is, that it is God's creation and it can been seen positively as a place of grace, where we encounter God and grow in God's love, OR, it can be seen negatively as a place of sin and damnation and the enemy of the Gospel. Some writings speak that way- opposing the way of the faith to "the world".

The Gospel of Luke pulls in the direction of affirming the world. It is both God's creation and the space where history and human action happens. In Luke's time the Roman Empire was the reality and structure of political space. It was neither evil or sin, it just was the reality in his time. It was the context in which his Gospel was preached. Luke saw that Christianity was compatible with the culture and reality of his day.

In Luke's Gospel he makes a point of placing the narrative precisely in a set time and place, with known people and events for example in the Bethlehem narrative.

"In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that the whole world should be enrolled.
This was the first enrollment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria. So all went to be enrolled, each to his own town. And Joseph too went up from Galilee from the town of Nazareth to Judea, to the city of David that is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and family of David. (Luke 2:1-4)"

The names of Caesar Augustus and Quirinius lock Jesus' birth into a specific moment of human history. Luke uses the same approach when John the Baptist appeared and Jesus began his ministry, and also at his death. He places all the events in the reality of the time. Jesus' life was not lived in a forgotten corner, Luke places him firmly on the world's stage.

The world is the arena of God's grace.

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HOW NEW WHS LAWS AFFECT US

Under the New WHS Laws regarding managing the risk of COVID-19 we are required to maintain physical distancing of 1.5m between seated persons who do not live together, on each row . This means that everyone needs to sit in the marked spots as directed by our ushers, we are also unable to kneel due to this requirement.

We also must have safe hygiene practices, cleaning and disinfecting high traffic areas and shared surfaces. This means that we need people to sanitise their hands upon entry, directly before communion and when asked to by a COVID Safety Team Member, Parish Leadership or Staff. There is also to be no communion from the Chalice or on the tongue. We also need to clean after each service.

The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading

Is 40:1-5. 9-11

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

The glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it.

'Console my people, console them' says your God.

'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for,

that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes.' A voice cries, 'Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord. Make a straight highway for our God across the desert. Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.' Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear, say to the towns of Judah, 'Here is your God.' Here is the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him. The prize of his victory is with him, his trophies all go before him. He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms, holding them against his breast and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

God's grace has been revealed, and it has made salvation possible for the whole human race and taught us that what we have to do is to give up everything that does not lead to God, and all our worldly ambitions; we must be self-restrained and live good and religious lives here in this present world, while we are waiting in hope for the blessing which will come with the Appearing of the glory of our great God and saviour Christ Jesus. He sacrificed himself for us in order to set us free from all wickedness and to purify a people so that it could be his very own and would have no ambition except to do good.

When the kindness and love of God our saviour for mankind were revealed, it was not because he was concerned with any righteous actions we might have done ourselves; it was for no reason except his own compassion that he saved us, by means of the cleansing water of rebirth and by renewing us with the Holy Spirit which he has so generously poured over us through Jesus Christ our saviour. He did this so that we should be justified by his grace, to become heirs looking forward to inheriting eternal life.

When Jesus had been baptised and had been praying, the heavens were opened and the Holy Spirit came upon him.

A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire.'

Now when all the people had been baptised and while Jesus after his own baptism was at prayer, heaven opened and the Holy Spirit descended on him in bodily shape, like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on you.'

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.
