Dear Parish Family,

“...give me some of that water...”

Over the coming weekends leading up to Easter, we will reflect on themes that help prepare those who are to be baptised at Easter and help all of us as we prepare to renew our own baptismal promises. This Sunday we focus on water.

We know what it's like to live in a dry country. That is why most of our population lives along the coast. Water determines where people live, how they travel, and how they survive. It was no different in the Holy Land. Travel often meant following a river or knowing where wells could be found and the taste of that water in the wells was never too fresh. Without water, there is no life.

In the first reading, we hear of the struggles of Moses with the people as they journey toward the Promised Land. They are thirsty. Their desperation leads them to question Moses – and even God: “Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die of thirst?” In their discomfort, they begin to regret leaving Egypt. They remember they had water and plenty of it and are happy to forget the slavery they endured. Their physical thirst exposes more: a lack of trust.

Then in the Gospel, we encounter Jesus and the Samaritan woman in the Gospel of John. The encounter is layered with a lot of historical and cultural meaning. Let's break it down... When Jesus asks her for a drink, he breaks two significant taboos. First, a man – especially a Rabbi – would not publicly speak to an unaccompanied woman. Second, Jews and Samaritans had deep religious hostility. Jews worshipped in Jerusalem; Samaritans were centred on Mount Gerizim. Yet Jesus crosses both barriers. He begins with a simple human request: “Give me a drink.” By doing so, he wins her attention.

Jesus then moves the conversation declaring that the time is coming when “true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth. “No longer be confined to a mountain or a temple.... not limited by place. Having broken down the walls between them, Jesus reveals himself clearly as the promised Messiah. Being transformed she leaves her water jar behind – a beautiful symbol – and rushes back to her town. She becomes a missionary. And an effective one. Because of her testimony, many come to Jesus and encounter him personally. Her thirst leads not only to her own conversion, but to the faith of others.

Jesus speaks of “living water.” All people thirst. The Israelites thirsted for water but misunderstood what God was doing among them. The Samaritan woman came seeking ordinary water but discovered she was thirsting for meaning, truth, and love. What do we thirst for? In a world of excess and constant noise, our thirst has not disappeared. Technology has not simplified our lives. We still crave more – the newest, the fastest, the best. We chase comfort, success, recognition. Yet even when we have these things, something within us remains unsatisfied. Can you name your thirst?

The living water Jesus offers is not something temporary, it is for life. In baptism we receive our deepest identity: beloved sons and daughters of God. We receive the Spirit who guides us toward what truly matters. May this Lenten journey help us recognise our deepest thirst – and allow Christ to satisfy it.

Our attention this week has been drawn to the troubled Middle East and the uncertainty about where events may lead. In moments such as these, the Church invites us not to give way to fear, but to turn to prayer – confident that God is present even amid unrest.

O God, who have revealed that peacemakers are to be called your children, grant, we pray, that we may work without ceasing to establish that justice which alone ensures true and lasting peace. Through Christ, the prince of peace. Amen

First Reading (Exodus 17:3-7)

A reading from the book of Exodus

Tormented by thirst, the people complained against Moses. 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt?' they said. 'Was it so that I should die of thirst, my children too, and my cattle?' Moses appealed to the Lord. 'How am I to deal with this people?' he said. 'A little more and they will stone me!' The Lord said to Moses, 'Take with you some of the elders of Israel and move on to the forefront of the people; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the river, and go. I shall be standing before you there on the rock, at Horeb. You must strike the rock, and water will flow from it for the people to drink.' This is what Moses did, in the sight of the elders of Israel. The place was named Massah and Meribah because of the grumbling of the sons of Israel and because they put the Lord to the test by saying, 'Is the Lord with us, or not?'

Responsorial Psalm (Ps 94:1-2. 6-9. R. v.8)

(R.) If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.

1. Come, ring out our joy to the Lord; hail the rock who saves us. Let us come before him, giving thanks, with songs let us hail the Lord. **(R.)**

2. Come in; let us bow and bend low; let us kneel before the God who made us for he is our God and we the people who belong to his pasture, the flock that is led by his hand. **(R.)**

3. O that today you would listen to his voice! 'Harden not your hearts as at Meribah, as on that day at Massah in the desert when your fathers put me to the test; when they tried me, though they saw my work.' **(R.)**

Second Reading (Romans 5:1-2. 5-8)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Through our Lord Jesus Christ by faith we are judged righteous and at peace with God, since it is by faith and through Jesus that we have entered this state of grace in which we can boast about looking forward to God's glory. This hope is not deceptive, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us. We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man – though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die – but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners.

Gospel Acclamation (See John 4:42. 15)

Glory to you, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ!
Lord, you are truly the Saviour of the world;
give me living water, that I may never thirst again.
Glory to you, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ!

Gospel (John 4:5-15. 19-26. 39-42)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give me a drink, you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again: but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman, 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. I see you are a prophet, sir. Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know; for salvation comes from the Jews. But the hour will come – in fact it is here already – when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth: that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants. God is spirit, and those who worship must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony, so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world.'
