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Reflection for The Twenty—Second Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A — 3rd September 2023

In contrast to last Sunday, today's Gospel is about denial, not self-indulgence. It's about losing, not gaining. It's about subtraction, not addition. It's about less, not more. It's about transformation, not glorification.

Jesus summons us to follow him. Follow him in refusing to make wealth and power the ultimate meaning of life. "Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do. Scripture teaches us that Christian life is not about winning or staying on top of the social ladder.

Life is fully lived when it can make a difference to others, that it can transform society and make it into a mirror of God's Kingdom. In the Gospel Jesus asks for commitment from his followers

Nelson Mandela tells the story of when he was struggling to establish himself as a young lawyer in Johannesburg and became friendly with Hans Muller a businessman. Muller saw the world through the prism of supply and demand. Muller advised Nelson that he must work hard for money, and nothing else but money. Once you have enough money, there is nothing else in life that you will want.

Mandella was an intelligent man. If he had taken Muller's advice, he could have done very well for himself. Luckily for South Africa he didn't look after 'Number One', instead Mandela decided to dedicate himself to serving his country.

We live in an age of finger pointing. Look at our politics. But we don't need politics to teach us how to point fingers. We are pretty good at it ourselves. We love to notice how everyone else is doing wrong. We often forget that the Gospel is not a tool by which we measure the actions of others. Rather, the Gospel is a mirror by which we judge ourselves. It takes courage to look in the mirror and courage to change what we see. A religion of commitment is a religion of challenge, risk, and unselfishness, not comfort and centred on self.

Being a disciple is a serious business. Yet this doesn't mean that suffering is something Christians should seek. Jesus did not seek suffering. Gethsemane makes that clear

The most important task at hand is that we learn to live the Gospel afresh. We learn to be true "leaven and salt" to the world. Pope Francis has reminded us time and time again, that the Church should not be a museum. It is not in yearning for, or holding onto the familiar, but in reimagining the future and venturing into the unknown chaos, reading the signs of the times, that we shall find new life.

This Sunday, Jesus puts a cross in front of us, and asks us to get in line. This is the time to just do it. John France

Letter from Bishop Michael Kennedy Received Friday 25th August. To Parish Priests and Parish Leaders

As you may be aware, an action from the 2022 Catholic Schools Review was to transition schools to a single community engagement model. The Parent Engagement Group (PeG) model was identified as the supported model, eventually leading to dissolution of the Parent and Friends Associations (P&F Associations) in our schools. The evolution to a single model is in response to the declining engagement of families in official school forums across the Diocese and recognises the importance of consistency.

The initial date flagged for this transition was 31 December 2023, this has since been extended to 31 December 2025. In addition, the Trustees have accepted a subsequent recommendation that schools' PeG forums be renamed Family and Community Engagement (FACE). This name change recognises that school engagement is larger than just parents and highlights our Catholic schools' inclusive nature.

Furthermore, the acronym FACE is a symbolic representation that the Church views families and community as being at the forefront of schools. With change comes opportunity for improvement. As part of the transition process, we have tasked the Diocesan Governance Team to develop a strengthened framework for the FACE in consultation with key stakeholder groups, including clergy, parishes, families, and school staff. I am hopeful that by partnering to support the Governance Team in this process, we can increase family engagement in our schools and parishes, thus, the life of the Church.

Governance Meeting


Parish Leaders from the Wattagan Deanery, (Parishes of Shortland, Wallsend, Glendale, Warners Bay, Boolaroo, Booragul, Toronto, Morisset) together with their Parish Secretaries, met with Megan Grainger, head of the Diocesan Governance Team, Brendan Upcroft, Diocesan Risk & Insurance Adviser and Fr Matthew Muller Diocesan Chancelor & VG on Wednesday at Warners Bay Parish Hall. This Governance meeting which is also being held in other locations around the Diocese, discussed ongoing parish viability, and changes in the insurance landscape (including CCI entering in to run off, and the new complaints framework).

After many years of Insurance cover from Catholic Church Insurance, CCI advised the Aust Bishops (ACBC), that it would no longer be able to offer Insurance, to meet the demands of the Australian Catholic Church.

Recently Bishop Michael Kennedy in a letter to Parish Leaders said, 'It is the intension of the Dioceses of Australia to work together, where possible, to seek new insurance coverage for our parishes, schools, and agencies so that we continue to have cover across all parishes, schools, and agencies. This includes insurance for the likes of property and public liability. The Diocese remains fully committed to meeting its financial responsibility for any substantiated sexual abuse claims made against it. The Diocese will continue to pursue concrete ways to repair wrongdoings, including through the payment of compensation, and to bring some healing, where that is possible.

The Diocese has been working for many years to ensure abuse claims are handled fairly, whether cases are covered by insurance policies or not'.

The meeting was informed that AON Insurance Brokers, have been appointed to manage the Insurance, of the Catholic Church.



About the Community Jigsaw image:

The Community Jigsaw that has been used during National Child Protection Week is based on research by Dr Sharon Bessell, Australian National University from the Children Communities and Social Capital Report.

During the research, a 9-year-old girl pointed out that "A community is like a puzzle, you need to have all the bits to make it work."

This gave the researchers the idea to use the jigsaw as a way to graphically represent the elements that children identify as central to a positive community.

When all the pieces are in place, a community is strong and supportive of children. The more pieces that are removed, the less supportive the community is for children.

In some cases, so many pieces are missing that the jigsaw falls apart. At this point, communities have become dysfunctional places from children's perspective.

The Community Jigsaw can also be an important tool for policymakers and practitioners. The key question is "how do we ensure as many pieces as possible are in place?".

We need to ask how policies, services and interventions can reinforce pieces of the Community Jigsaw that are already in place and add those that are missing.

In reinforcing and adding pieces of the Community Jigsaw, it is crucial that those pieces that children consider to be in place and working well are not undermined. In some communities, the decision may be taken to focus on strengthening one piece of the Community Jigsaw because that piece is weak or missing. In doing so, it is important that decisions are based on knowledge of the local area, including – crucially – children's knowledge.

In this representation of the Community Jigsaw, the edges are left unfinished. This shows that this research is not exhaustive or comprehensive, and the Community Jigsaw can be refined and extended based on future research with children.

What is Safeguarding. & The National Catholic Safeguarding Standards.

The 'Standards' have been developed to ensure the safety of all who encounter the Church, with a focus on children and adults at risk. The Standards hold the Catholic Church to the highest degree of accountability in response to failures uncovered by the Royal Commission.

These Standards are a 'must do', not an option, for all Diocese's and Parishes to adopt. To ensure that Diocese's and Parishes are compliant with the Standards, they will be systematically audited.

Standard 1 Committed leadership, governance and culture The safeguarding of children and adults is embedded in the entity's leadership, governance and culture, and focuses on how leadership influences a positive safeguarding culture. Strong leadership includes an accountable and transparent governance structure within an entity.

This Standard includes the expectation of zero tolerance to abuse and that all people (children and adults) are provided a safe environment, free from abuse and discrimination.

Some Points to Ponder.

Did you Know?

Preface (Latin prefacio, a saying beforehand) The prayer of praise and thanksgiving that introduces the Eucharistic prayer at Mass. It ends with the acclamation, 'Holy. holy, holy Lord, God of power and might

Eucharistic Prayer That part of the Mass that begins with the Preface, after the Holy, holy, holy, and ends with the Great Amen, just before the Our Father.

Anamnesis. A Greek word meaning 'memorial', calling to mind. It is that part of the Eucharistic Prayer which begins just after the acclamation that follows the consecration.

Perpetual Day of Remembrance

In 2020 Bishop Bill Wright decreed Perpetual Day of Remembrance Sunday 10th September as a feast inscribed in the diocesan liturgical calendar. It is the desire of Bishop Michael Kennedy that we continue to mark the Perpetual Day of Remembrance in our parishes — particularly on Perpetual Day of Remembrance Sunday. On this day we pray that the abuse that devastated the lives of so many children and young people and their families, never happens again.

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140TH JUBILEE OF THE SISTERS OF ST JOSEPH, LOCHINVAR

On Monday 4 September the Sisters of St Joseph, Lochinvar are celebrating 140 years of ministry within the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle. Four Sisters arrived from Perthville on 2 September, 1883 and enrolled the first children in Primary school the next day. We rejoice that this ministry of education continues today in many schools throughout the Diocese in the hands of faith-filled, deeply committed lay teachers. And so it is with great joy, that we give God thanks for the graces and blessings given to us, our students, their parents, our school staff and friends over these many years. So says Abbey, one of our Pastoral Placement Participants, about her recent experience in the program. Each fortnight, the participants reflect upon their placement and journal the practical aspects as well as the spiritual formation elements that are shaping their own faith journey.

The Pastoral Placement Program is an opportunity, provided by the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, for people to explore a variety of pathways that might help them find meaning and purpose whilst working within the Church community. Along the way, participants will encounter their own growth as they see the value in how their work can make a difference to the lives of others.

Abbey has recently been placed in Youth Ministry at St Paul's Booragul. She was mentored by previous Pastoral Placement Participant and now current Youth Minister, Summer. Together, in their ministerial work, the pair have implemented a social justice movement called Young Christian Students. They meet each week and follow the teachings of the "formation through action" movement of the program. They provide an opportunity for students who are passionate about social justice issues to work for a more just society consistent with the teachings and values of Jesus Christ. They challenge students to focus on the reality of their own lives and the lives of those around them including the needs of the students and their local community.

"It really has given me time to think about my purpose in life and God's plan. I have come away with a renewed perspective on my faith, whilst recognizing that mine is different to those around me," says Abbey.

The program offers a multitude of opportunities for participants to work with people from a large variety of agencies, encountering and accompanying communities as they go forth as missionary disciples, promoting the Kingdom of God on earth.

The program also allows participants to research and explore an area that lies close to their heart. Kristine is currently working on a project that involves facilitating induction and training opportunities for parishes who wish to be a part of the Neighbourhood Companions Program. The program trains skillsets that assist people in accompanying members of the community through active listening, spiritual companionship and intentional engagement in conversations and social interactions.

"My experience is undoubtedly coloured by my experience in the parish placement space in PPP. I feel that I would like my gifts to be used for the service of others. "

Morgan has had a number of incredible moments within her various placements. She recalls a time when she was visiting an elderly resident in a nursing home, where she was asked to sing to a woman in her final stages of life.

"What happened to me next was a God moment. In that moment there was a profound connection between us, and the words being sung held an ever deeper meaning and purpose. I haven't been able to stop thinking about this beautiful pastoral connection that was made; I was so deeply moved I had to take a moment to gather myself immediately afterwards."

Xanthe is passionate about social justice issues. Earlier in the year she had a placement working at the Mission to Seafarers. Following one of her placements, she visited St Pius Adamstown High School and spoke in front of over five hundred students about the conditions of the workers on the ships that enter our harbour. Her speech had such an impact that numerous donations of care packs were made by students from the school community to be handed out to Seafarers. Xanthe has spread her wings to become more involved in the Hunter Community Alliance. She has recently accepted the position within the HHSI committee, focusing on public and social housing.

"I've loved getting involved in the Hunter Community Alliance, and it feels like the space that I want to be in. I'm feeling passionate about the work that I can contribute to the housing, homelessness, and social justice team."

These 'on the ground' ministry work placements help participants to explore the many ways that are available for them to serve God and the local community.
