In today's Gospel the Pharisees refuse to accept the story of the cure of the blind man, because that would mean they'd have to accept Jesus.

As we continue our journey through this season of Lent, we are met with the question of who is worthy in God's eyes. The question of human suffering was a big problem in biblical times. It still is a big problem. Suffering was seen as God's punishment for sin. Hence, when the apostles saw the blind man in todays Gospel, they immediately concluded that his blindness was the result of sin. And they asked Jesus 'Why was the man blind?' Who sinned? Was it the man himself or his parents?

The Word of God on this Fourth Sunday in Lent speaks of the God who does not look, judge and behave the way we human beings are inclined to do by our worst nature. On the contrary, we come face-to-face with not only a benevolent God, but also one who is drawn to the lowly and the marginalised.

We acknowledge the traditional custodians of this land, the Awabakal People who, long before us lived, loved, educated and raised their children on this Country. We pay our respects to Elders past and present and we recognise the young people who are our future. We acknowledge all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families in our communities. We respect their deep physical and spiritual connections to Country through their stories, traditions and living cultures.

REFLECTION FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT: 19 March 2023

I was reading a commentary of my favourite Theologian, Sr Mary McGlone on this Gospel and she made me aware of something I hadn't thought of before. The blind man in the Gospel never said a word before his cure. He didn't complain about being ostracised because of his disability, he just did the best he could. He was the object of people's judgement "surely he must have sinned to be so afflicted?" As she said he was just there for Jesus to see.

What Jesus saw was a person with the potential of showing God's abundant love. So Jesus made a paste of clay, and touched the man. He used the mud as if it was an anointing, he smeared it on the man's useless eyes. He then invited the man's acceptance by commanding him to go and wash. The man had no idea what the outcome would be, but, he did as he was asked and went away to wash. He came back transformed! He could see! He was no longer invisible.

Then his troubles started! People had trouble seeing him as their neighbour, whom they knew well, as a blind beggar. They doubted their own eyes when they saw him whole and sighted. It turned their world view upside down, their sense of justice, sin and retribution. Because of his sin he must have been punished with blindness-so- now he can see- where is the justice.

Even the religious leaders could not accept that this had happened. The man however stuck to his story and said "I was blind, but now I can see." Then he went one step further and said "Never, ever has anyone healed someone born blind! How could he do it without Gods help?"

As a result he was vilified for trying to instruct them! So they excommunicated him, presumably because he was healed and had the nerve to say that the person who healed him must be on God's side.

How dare he!

Again Jesus took the initiative and sought him out. He asked him if he believed in the Son of man, who was to come. To his credit the man wholeheartedly said "I do believe!"

The blind man can be seen as everyone. He is the one we all can identify with. No matter what our mindset is, whether we are convinced of our ideals, we may be people who wish others to make our decisions for us, whatever we are, we are also invited to be the person who realises that they are blind and are willing to be given sight.

As Mary concluded:- "We must accept that we are all blind when it comes to seeing the depth and breadth of God's possibilities."

This Lent can we be open to God's possibilities? Or are we diminished by our fears and preconceptions? I hope we are open. Uta France

This training forms part of the Diocese's mandatory training regime and is specifically designed to support paid and unpaid helpers undertaking a broad range of ministries in church facilities and out in the community. The training targets the safeguarding needs of faith communities. The course will address:

- •the Diocese's Safeguarding Framework policy
- •indicators of risk and vulnerability
- indicators of abuse and neglect
- •boundaries in ministry
- •responding to disclosures
- reporting obligations
- •contributing to a 'Safe' culture

Priscilla lives in the Hwange district in Zimbabwe with her husband, Charles, and their two grandsons. Climate change continues to bring unprecedented challenges for people living in the most vulnerable and remote communities in Zimbabwe. With the support of Caritas Hwange, Priscilla learnt conservation farming skills to grow drought-resistant crops to support her family during the

current food crisis. Priscilla was able to produce a bumper harvest in her first year of practising conservation farming. Priscilla used the funds from her harvest to start poultry farming, which enabled her to sell eggs to pay for her grandchildren's school fees, books and stationery. The poultry farming provides a safety net for Priscilla and her family during times of hardship, like the current drought.

While the situation in Zimbabwe and across eastern Africa remains dire, the work of Caritas Hwange means that Priscilla can learn the skills she needs to build resilience and support her family during this current food crisis.

In the presence of the Lord God, they anointed David king of Israel.

The Lord said to Samuel, 'Fill your horn with oil and go. I am sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem, for I have chosen myself a king among his sons.' When Samuel arrived, he caught sight of Eliab and thought, 'Surely the Lord's anointed one stands there before him,' but the Lord said to Samuel, 'Take no notice of his appearance or his height for I have rejected him; God does not see as man sees; man looks at appearances but the Lord looks at the heart.' Jesse presented his seven sons to Samuel, but Samuel said to Jesse, 'The Lord has not chosen these.' He then asked Jesse, 'Are these all the sons you have?' He answered, 'There is still one left, the youngest; he is out looking after the sheep.' Then Samuel said to Jesse, 'Send for him; we will not sit down to eat until he comes.' Jesse had him sent for, a boy of fresh complexion, with fine eyes and pleasant bearing. The Lord said, 'Come, anoint him, for this is the one.' At this, Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him where he stood with his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord seized on David and stayed with him from that day on.

Try to discover what the Lord wants of you, having nothing to do with the futile works of darkness but exposing them by contrast. The things which are done in secret are things that people are ashamed even to speak of; but anything exposed by the light will be illuminated and anything illuminated turns into light. That is why it is said:

Wake up from your sleep, rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.

Jn 9:1. 6-9. 13-17. 34-38

The blind man went off and washed himself and came away with his sight restored.

As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. He spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored.

His neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging said, 'Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man himself said, 'I am the man.'

They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees asked him how he had come to see, he said, 'He put a paste on my eyes, and I washed, and I can see.' Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This man cannot be from God: he does not keep the sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them. So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man. 'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove him away.

Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe', and worshipped him.

You and me, and the rising sea

I recently attended a conference on the 'Synod on Synodality and Climate Change' with the bishops of Oceania on the beautiful island of Fiji.

My two 'take homes' from the conference; Synodality is integral to the survival and salvation of all Christian communities and must offer better gender inclusion moving forward; and two, climate change is a call and a demand of the earth and ocean for greater protection, action and care.

The Pope launched the Synod on Synodality, in October 2021, as an invitation to the whole church, via a number of regional stages, to reflect on leadership which is inclusive, open, transparent, and overtly listening. This synodal process will culminate in 2024. As I reflect on the process of Synodality, I note that we are always a work in progress and we can always do better.

I also walked away from the conference with a greater sense of urgency that a global and personal response to climate change is demanded of me. It's not just about governments or the global village, it's about me and my response as well.

The oceans form one lung of the earth's oxygen production and carbon assimilation. It works in much the same way as areas like the Amazon Rainforest. Two lungs for the life and regeneration of the planet. One doesn't work as well without the other. Both need care.

Standing in the village of Togoru between, what was once, the town cemetery and the homes of the villagers themselves, was an eye opening experience. It is in that space you realise the true reality of climate change, in four or five years' the village will no longer exist. The cemetery is only visible at low tide when the tops of the gravestones poke through the waves moving over them. Acres of the village have been consumed by the rising waters of the Pacific Ocean.

This village's story is not unique, more communities across the Oceania region will be forced to relocate to other parts of their island home or to new regions in the Pacific. Nations such as

Kiribati remain on a knife edge as the rising waters threaten the islands' infrastructure.

Whether we believe in climate change or not, most agree that we cannot sustain the continued destruction of our natural resources or the polluting of our natural home as we have been doing. Governments must do more to find a better way to produce fuels and reduce emissions.

However, it is not just up to politicians.

We all play a significant personal role in saving the planet. Being aware, informed and committed to reducing waste helps.

Creating less garbage, recycling more and using natural packaging more effectively, will assist in the care of the earth and ocean.

How and where we dispose of our waste should be a mindful and thoughtful commitment to sustainability long term, creating lasting change for future generations.

"Welcome to Newcastle" is a phrase that Novocastrians are again becoming accustomed to saying as more and more people are deciding that the once Steel City is home. This week we excitedly await the installation of Bishop Michael Kennedy as the 9th Bishop of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle. You will also have seen the construction works on the corner of Tutor St and Parry St as our new Diocesan Christian Library takes shape. We envision the new library as a special space for human connection and enlightenment by God's infinite grace.

One of the blessings of the ongoing growth of Newcastle is the diversity of new people arriving here bringing with them a wealth of gifts, ideas, and experiences. Many are passionate and generous individuals who have a genuine desire to share these with others and to contribute to our community.

This week, Faith Matters sat down with Australian Writer, Michael Hislop. A recent settler in Newcastle, Michael Hislop moved from Sydney a year ago and was warmly welcomed by the parishioners of Immaculate Heart of Mary, Tighes Hill. As a newcomer, he enrolled in the Christian Formation Course run by the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, and it was here that Michael shared his love of Philosophy and Writing.

Poetry is Michael's first Love which he confesses to writing every day under the pseudonym "MH." He has just Released two Books entitled 'A Tale of Opposites' and 'Soul Searching' both of which are available on Amazon and Kindle. He is currently finishing his first novel and several other Projects.

Michael is accustomed to writing of various kinds as he holds degrees in Politics, International Relations, and African Decolonization, as well as holding a Juris Doctor. In our interview, Michael described how writing poetry and literature was different than the formulaic writing of the academic and business worlds. For him, a writer must seek to engage and interrogate the world from a place of Heart and Soul and a foundation of abiding Faith alongside a wide experience of the Human condition. "I am a Writer and a Poet. I write about the good, the bad and all sorts. I aim to hold a mirror to our World. I strive for a better World."

Michael, the first of seven children, was born in India to Christian missionary parents. Due to the strictness of his upbringing, Michael said that he walked away from his Faith in his teenage years. Yet, he says that as he grew older, he came aware of a compelling and abiding Faith that was strangely strong and a source of great comfort and wonder. He says that he found his relationship with The Divine provided him with a crucial foothold in which to understand himself and his place in the greater scheme of things. Forming a connection and a community of Faith which placed him in a more fundamental communion with The All. It was these experiences of reconnection with his Christian cultural roots that spurred him to begin to write.

Having travelled widely, Michael is well-versed in the world's societies and cultures, and he has an abiding love and respect for humanity, its history and traditions and stories, as well as the natural environment.

Michael's writings are born out of his diverse personal experiences and the rich library of ancient stories and ideas about being Human. He gets emotional talking about this, expressing an enduring love and appreciation of the legacies bestowed on us by those who walked before. However, he notes that it is important to reimagine them so that they fit into a contemporary context as relevant to how people today choose to live their lives.

Historically "God" was seen as all-encompassing, omnipresent, and omniscient, however, when God is talked about today this is most often not the case. God in contemporary Australia is not well understood within the context of the ancient and rich ideas from which our understanding has been born.

"Our most ancient stories are about Being Human... We are not just bags of skin and bones living in a physical sense. We are much more than this... Most of my peers today do not even realize that they are a sovereign and eternal Soul. And in much of the modern domain, it is almost unseemly to talk about this... And, I wonder and ask why..."

"Our world is supposed to be based on the ideas and ideals of our greatest thinkers and scientists, but there is a vast and growing gulf between how our world works and how it could and should be..." Michael's two million plus readers around the world regularly tell him of how tough Life is becoming... "It is generally harder to meet the needs of Life, it is harder to feed and educate the kids... People the world over still suffer most often needlessly."

Michael believes and argues that a central Principle of Christianity is the need to respond with kindness and compassion to those most vulnerable and those in need. "The power of the Story of Christ is his exemplar of compassion and self-sacrifice as an ultimate expression of love and surrender to The All. Faith for some can be a lofty idea only for Sundays, whereas for others like myself, Faith and Belief are the core of a feasible and Right relationship with both my fellows and The Divine. Being a Christian means replicating as far as we are able the Example of Christ."

"Most people don't realize that the Catholic Church is one of the most present and active agencies in our world responding to the needs and demands of the most vulnerable of us across the world. This is rarely publicized or reported. The scale of these endeavours is truly enormously and is only made possible on the strength of our communities."

It is always important to consider those in need but more especially during the season of Lent. Each year, Project Compassion comes as a timely reminder of the importance of solidarity and how a single act of kindness – whether big or small, can make a life-changing impact in the lives of those who need it most.
