As we approach the end of the Church's Liturgical Year, the readings look forward to the end of time.

Speculation about the end of time as we know it, is not unusual. We live in a world which is full of confusion, social and political turmoil, and lurch from one crises to another. This uncertainty can cause great fear and anxiety. We are still here. The end has not yet come.

The Gospel tells us there will be natural disasters and that we will be persecuted. But at the end, we're told: "By patient endurance we will save our lives."

Our churches may not be destroyed like the temple in Jerusalem. But in many ways, the death of the old way of being church is already evident for all to see: our reputation, moral credibility and trust have effectively been destroyed in the wake of the sexual abuse crisis

Like Francis of Assisi and his namesake Pope Francis, let us go and rebuild the church of God which will "shine with its healing rays" after the burning. Just like the early Christians, we are told to take heart and discern the way of God in times of crisis.

We acknowledge the traditional custodians of this land, the Awabakal People who, long before us lived, loved, educated and raised their children on this Country. We pay our respects to Elders past and present and we recognise the young people who are our future. We acknowledge all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families in our communities. REFLECTION FOR THE 33RD SUNDAY O/T YR C 13TH NOVEMBER 2022

This week marks the last week of Ordinary Time in the Church's calendar & next week's description of the Crucifixion concludes the Year of Luke, so it is in this context that we need

to read today's Gospel passage.

In the interval between the arrival of Jesus in Jerusalem & his execution outside the city, the Temple plays a significant role. You'll recall how he cleansed it of the merchants & then made it his base for teaching - but in this instance, the peoples' comments about the magnificence of the building immediately trigger a series of warnings from him.

He states in no uncertain terms that they are about to experience a period of distress, betrayal & persecution, stretching well into the future - but that ultimately, God's love & mercy will triumph, not only in their own lives but also in the world.

The language of passages such as today's Gospel can be off-putting at times, and in particular when they are interpreted literally--- graphic descriptions certainly lend themselves to predictions of doom & gloom! We must remember that this Gospel was written about 50 years or more AFTER the death of Jesus, so at the time of writing, many of the events mentioned had already

come to pass. The message for the community then, was not to despair because all of it was anticipated by Jesus but also that ultimately the reign of God would come about & the effort & distress endured would be vindicated.

It is not written as a biography but as a means of conveying a message about Jesus, so the writer seeks to give comfort to his audience by having Jesus "predict" all the things that have actually happened in their community! His overall message to them is to have faith in him & KEEP GOING, telling them that their ENDURANCE will win them their lives! He assures his disciples that the kingdom will surely come to pass. This, then, is the promise that we affirm every time we say the Creed.

Hollywood has done very well out of movies about "the end of the world", so much so that the word "apocalypse" has somehow assumed that meaning - - - however, it's correct meaning comes from the Greek word " to lift a veil" or "reveal". Therefore, the apocalypse is NOT the END of the world, but the REVELATION that will come at the end of the world. Writings such as today's Gospel passage about what will happen at the end of the world & how God will be REVEALED are described in the Christian tradition as " apocalyptic writing" -- the most famous of these writings is called the book of Revelation.

Our Christian expectation of the risen Lord's return in glory is of profound importance to us. It is the horizon against which we believers live out our Gospel lives.

In our world today, many Centuries after the Gospels were written, all successive predictions have proven to be false. Even contemporary threats--the possibility of planetary catastrophe from either nuclear war or global warming are no guide to the divine wisdom which will determine the ultimate destiny of creation. Faith & hope remain integral to our daily lives, as it was in the lives of the early Christians.

INTERFAITH DIALOGUE EXPLORES LEADERSHIP AND COMMUNITY

What does leadership look like in a Catholic, Jewish, Anglican or Buddhist community?

What are the differences? Are there any similarities?

Those questions were answered last week at the Diocesan Ecumenical and Interfaith Council's first Interfaith Dialogue event.

Almost 50 people were lucky enough to hear from Jonathan Mantel (Jewish), Father Greg Barker (Catholic), Bishop Peter Stuart (Anglican) and Greg Heathcoate (Buddhist) as they spoke about their different approaches to leadership and how it impacts their faith community.

A common thread among the presenters was that good leadership is not possible without consulting the people it impacts.

Attendee Moira Gordon thought the event was fantastic.

"I relished the opportunity to gather with others while we thought about what Leadership might mean to us and how different people might approach the topic," she said.

"All four speakers were quite unique and sparked different flavours of thought."

For Project Coordinator, Pastoral Ministries Alyson Segrott, the Interfaith Dialogue gave her a chance to connect with people from different backgrounds.

"It is important that we learn from each other and continue to develop friendships with other faiths," she said.

She believes the event shows how important learning about leadership across diverse faith communities is.

"It is the faith communities that drive the leadership. When change happens, it is important not to leave behind any of our community members, which is why it takes time to bring about change," Alyson said.

"In our learning the presentations challenged us to know more about our own faith leadership. They asked us to question whether this is the best model, could we do better with change, and what would we need to consider when making leadership changes moving forward?"

The Ecumenical and Interfaith Council are excited to host more events like this in the future – they're preparing for a big 2023.

BRENDON MANNYX: PRISON SUNDAY

This week's message comes to you from Brendon Mannyx, Manager Mission and Outreach.

Last Sunday, 6th November, was Prison Sunday. During the Year of Mercy in 2016, Pope Francis announced a Jubilee for Prisoners, and since that time the Bishops Commission for Social Justice, Mission and Service has continued to encourage dioceses and parishes to mark the first Sunday in November in recognition of those in prison and those who provide pastoral support to them.

Our Diocese currently supports two full-time prison chaplains and, through them, hundreds of incarcerated people and their families every year.

From 2013 – 2016, I was privileged to serve as a sessional chaplain, attending prison one day a week. In 2015, I shared the following reflection with my parish community.

BRENDON MANNYX PUBLISHED NOVEMBER 08, 2022

There's a bit in the New Testament where St Paul writes about his personal struggles. And he writes:

I have pleaded with the Lord three times for it to leave me.

We can imagine St Paul's cry as one similar to our own:

Lord, take away this thorn in my side. Take away my weakness, my pain, my sorrow, my brokenness.

And God's reply:

'My grace is enough for you: my power is at its best in weak-

God dwells in our weakness. God is at home in our brokenness. This is the place where God's presence is often made known. Why is that? What does that mean? It goes against everything the world tells us. It goes against everything we learn at school, through work, in the media. Do better, be the best, be strong, be independent. Be beautiful, be rich, be popular. We hide from pain. We pride ourselves in being successful, in not needing any help. Yet God says my power is at its best in weakness. My Spirit is able to do so much more in your brokenness and your struggles. God turns worldly wisdom upside-down. And we can learn much from what God is saying. Do not give anyone food who refuses to work.

You know how you are supposed to imitate us: now we were not idle when we were with you, nor did we ever have our meals at anyone's table without paying for them; no, we worked night and day, slaving and straining, so as not to be a burden on any of you. This was not because we had no right to be, but in order to make ourselves an example for you to follow.

We gave you a rule when we were with you: not to let anyone have any food if he refused to do any work. Now we hear that there are some of you who are living in idleness, doing no work themselves but interfering with everyone else's. In the Lord Jesus Christ, we order and call on people of this kind to go on quietly working and earning the food that they eat.

When some were talking about the Temple, remarking how it was adorned with fine stonework and votive offerings, Jesus said, 'All these things you are staring at now – the time will come when not a single stone will be left on another: everything will be destroyed.' And they put to him this question: 'Master,' they said, 'when will this happen, then, and what sign will there be that this is about to take place?'

'Take care not to be deceived,' he said, 'because many will come using my name and saying, "I am he" and, "The time is near at hand." Refuse to join them. And when you hear of wars and revolutions, do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen but the end is not soon.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will fight against nation, and kingdom against

kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name — and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives.'

Light in the World

For me, Faith means using kind words and the voice given to us by God to make a difference. I have faith that God has a purpose for me; if something unplanned and disastrous happens, I know that it is part of God's plan for me to grow, learn and become a better person. As Pope Francis tells us, "The worst enemy of a fragile faith is fear. Do not be afraid!" My faith in God helps me to face challenges with confidence and determination.

On February 28th, extreme weather caused unprecedented flooding in Northern NSW and left thousands of people homeless. As I began to research this, I was introduced to a man named Steve. He lives in a small NSW town located 300m from the Tweed River on the border of Queensland. Steve was strongly impacted by the devastating flooding and kindly let me interview him about his experience and faith.

Steve told me that as water began to rise, he and his neighbours moved their cars to higher ground at 4am as they thought they would experience minor flooding. However, the water rose faster than expected and later that day Steve and his neighbours had to evacuate.

"My wife and I packed a bag for what we thought would be 3 or 4 days before we would return to our home. Then we waded through the water to our neighbour's house," he explained.

The water eventually rose to extraordinary levels, and the flooding caused devastating damage to his newly renovated home. It swept away Steve's possessions and damaged 90% of everything he owned. Steve told me that at the time, he felt a great sense of loss; however, he felt a duty to fulfill in his community through looking after his elderly neighbours and being there for others to listen and be a friend.

When I asked Steve about his faith in God, he told me that "the Bible tells us to be a light in the world. Every day, I simply be the person I know Jesus would want me to be. I try to get to know others, care for them, and always believe that there are people worse off than I am. I try to be a friend," Steve told me.

Steve has a loving relationship with his wife and family. He added that he finds great strength in his relationship and connection with God, and he told me that his faith strongly helped him through this difficult chapter in life.

"For me, it's trust that God will be there to listen when you pray; and confidence that through his power, he will look after you. I understand my role in the world is to serve, and this led me to my work in charity," he added.

Steve's story inspired me. "We have our lives and that's what matters. We have lost our material possessions and although we will not return to the home we had, we have each other. We will rebuild, which means new opportunities for myself and my wife. I'm looking forward to being together in our home, going on holidays, and getting out and meeting new people," he exclaimed.

After this interview, I learned from Steve that connection to your faith is different for everyone – yet it is so important. Steve taught me that we don't need a badge of honour or special attention to spread the Word of God – if we are connected to him in our heart, we will 'be the light in the world.'
