Dear Parish Family,

Emmanuel ...God with us!

Last Sunday as we lit our third candle, the Rose candle symbolising joy, our Jewish brothers and sisters were lighting the first candle on the Menorah as they began the Feast of Hanukkah also known as the Festival of Lights. Hannukah celebrates the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem about two hundred years before the birth of Jesus. After a military victory, a miracle occurred where a single day's oil miraculously burned for eight days in the Temple.... hence the Menorah has eight candles. It is a joyful celebration usually for families to gather and to celebrate, somewhat like the Jewish version of Christmas! It's been a sad week after the tragic shooting at Bondi Beach. Having worked closely with Jewish communities in the hospital, I know the important meaning of this feast day. Jesus even celebrates it in John Gospel (10:22). Amongst the tragedy we also saw the bravery of many people. Rabbi Jeffrey, a friend who was supporting those wounded and their families, sent me this which was from one of his teachers. By Sunday, the last candle will be lit on the menorah, may it be a reminder of the light that brightens our darkest moments - God with us! As we gather this weekend, we keep in our prayers those who have died, those who are injured, those who took a brave stand and for those hurting at this time.



In this final week of Advent, we light candle number four – representing love! God's love is about to be revealed. Isaiah our Advent prophet is again the focus of our first reading. War was on the horizon and Ahaz, the king asks Isaiah for a sign, whether he should ally with a neighbouring country and wipe out the hostile neighbour or not. Isaiah speaks to the sign that of a woman will be with child in the future and that this is a reminder not to give up hope that God is with us. But alas the king refuses to believe and Israel falls.

Our Gospel focuses on the birth of Jesus with the Advent figures of Mary and Joseph. Matthew when writing the Gospel wanted to go back to where it all began and highlight that both Mary and Joseph were followers of the Law of Moses. Mary shows this with her brave yes and the first thing we learn about Joseph is he focussed his life on living according to God's law. Have you ever thought about what would have happened if Joseph didn't say yes! Let's face it, Joseph probably had reservations about being the guardian of the Son of God – it's a pretty big ask! Maybe the thought of divorcing was because he thought someone else could do a better job? The dream was to change everything, assured that God is with us Joseph moved past his fears and embraced Mary, Jesus and the will of God. A great model for all during these times of uncertainty.

As we enter this fourth week of Advent, we build on the Advent themes that from hope, peace and joy grows love. What areas of my life need God's healing love the most? How can I bring love to others this Christmas? As we look at the light of this candle, we celebrate the love we find in each other and in Jesus Christ.

This week, many families will gather with us to celebrate Christmas. The Diocese has reminded us that the Christmas story is our invitation to reach out to others and to call our community gatherings – a place to call home. It is an opportune time to invite friends, families and neighbours to be part of our family. Many people will be humbled by your invitation. This is the start of a journey, and it begins with an invitation.... who will you invite?

WELCOME

Welcome all visitors to our Parish of St John Vianney during the summer holiday season.

The Parish of St John Vianney Morisset, was officially formed in 1947, however our Mass center of St Patrick and St Brigid at Cooranbong, dates to the 1860's. The present Cooranbong Church celebrated its centenary in August 2006, and 150 years of Catholic presence in the area was celebrated in 2011. It is documented that Saint Mary McKillop visited Cooranbong where she had a convent school. Up until 1966 St John Vianney Parish was part of the Diocese of Sydney, but now it is part of the Diocese of Maitland / Newcastle, with Bishop Michael Kennedy as Bishop.

The 9.30am Mass at Morisset is recorded each Sunday and uploaded to the Parish Website and Facebook later in the day. This allows people in nursing facilities and those away from the parish for whatever reason, to keep 'in touch' with the parish.

THE CHRISTMAS SEASON

A mixture of the sacred and the secular characterizes the Christmas season today. Most people are comfortable with the situation, as Silent Night alternates with Rudolph, the Red-Nosed Reindeer.

In the 16th century, the Puritans in England came to power and outlawed, through Parliament, any observance of Christmas, under the pain of punishment. The Puritans then lost their political power, and the celebration of Christmas returned to England. Early Immigrants to America then took their Christmas traditions and attitudes with them. By the end of the 19th century, all states in America and Australia had granted legal recognition of Christmas Day.

VIOLENCE HAS NO PLACE.

Like many church communities and organisations around Australia, our parish also condemns last Sunday's shooting at a Jewish community Hanukkah celebration in Bondi. We stand with the Jewish community across Australia, with the people of Bondi, and with other churches, as they respond to this tragedy and continue the difficult work of building solidarity, care, and unity in its aftermath. Violence of this kind has no place in our society.

CATHOLIC COMMUNITY FUND (CCF) REPORT

2025 was a strong year for the CCF, delivering \$12.2 million to the Diocese and its agencies, including \$500,000 to parishes. Funding supported school expansions at Catherine McAuley Catholic College, Medowie, St Bede's Catholic College, Chisholm, St Michaels Primary School, Nelson Bay, and St James' Primary School, Kotara South.

The Fund also supported St Nicholas Early Education with the construction of two new centres at Kotara South and Forster, helping families access quality early learning environments that reflect the values of faith, care, and community. A major highlight included the establishment of the Bishop's Flood Appeal, contributing \$150,000 in local relief. Strong governance, compliance and capital growth position the Fund well as we move into 2026.

Let us pray together for peace: O God, creator of the world, who first revealed your love and salvation for humankind in and through the Jewish community, and who have revealed that peacemakers are to be called your children, grant we pray, that we may work without ceasing to establish that justice which alone ensures true and lasting peace. Matthew 1:18-24

Jesus was born of Mary, the betrothed of Joseph, a son of David.

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally. He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son
and they will call him Emmanuel,
a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.
