




THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C SUNDAY 30 OCT 2022

Today we hear the story of the conversion of the rich tax-collector, Zacchaeus. He had become a wealthy man, by overtaxing the poor.

Jesus is not opposed to wealth or possessions. He is opposed to stinginess. He is opposed to people's unwillingness to share with "the least of these." He is opposed to the lack of hospitality and kindness that allows us eagerly to share all the blessings we've been given. Jesus says to Zacchaeus, "Come down."

Perhaps that's exactly what he's saying to each of us: Come down. Come down from our arrogance, which tells us that what we possess we deserve to keep only for ourselves. Come down from the miserliness in us that wants to hoard our possessions, as though they alone will bring us happiness.

<u>REFLECTION FOR THE 31ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR C</u> – 30TH OCTOBER 2022

When Jesus stopped in Jericho, a town not far from Jerusalem, he was on his way there to face his dreaded death on the cross. His fame as a teacher and the stories of the miracles he had wrought had preceded him and so the crowds gathered to hear him

Among them was a man, Zacchaeus, a wealthy man and a senior tax collector. As such, he was despised by his fellow Jews, as a hated lackey of the Roman occupiers. Like others of his kind, he had to collect a certain amount in tax from the citizens; anything over and above this, he was able to keep for himself, so the scene was set for exploitation. On this occasion he was determined to see Jesus but he was of small stature and there was no way the crowd would part to let him through, so he ran ahead and climbed a tall tree to see Jesus as he passed. But Jesus did not pass by; he stopped, called to Zacchaeus to come down as he wanted to stay at his home. Zacchaeus, overjoyed, welcomed Christ into his heart and home. There is no doubt that Zacchaeus had already received the call of the Spirit, first in seeking Christ out and then in his immediate turn around, when he renounced his old way of life, promising to give half his possessions to the poor and repaying anyone he had cheated four times over.

The crowd, which had been so filled with anticipation at the thought of seeing and hearing Jesus, turned against him, just as the crowd did in Jerusalem. They grumbled about his consorting with such a sinner. They failed completely to understand that Christ came to offer his Salvation to all; he came for the sinners, "to seek out and save what was lost". His love is all inclusive. We just have to accept what is offered. Just as Jesus wanted to stay with Zacchaeus, so he wants to stay with us.

Luke's Gospel account leaves me asking myself to what lengths am I prepared to go to see and hear Jesus. How judgemental am I of other people who make life choices that are very different from mine?

We each have the opportunity to "see" and "hear" Jesus in the Scriptures; through these he "speaks" to us. He gives us two commandments: "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind" and "You shall love your neighbour as

yourself". (Matt 22:37,39) We can "see" Jesus in our fellow man: when we see someone hungry or thirsty and give them food or drink, when we welcome a stranger, or give comfort to the sick or grieving, Christ tells us "whenever you did this to one of the least of my brothers you did it to me". (Matt 25:40)

Last Sunday we were reminded of this in the video for Catholic Mission when we were asked to support the mission in Ethiopia. It is not possible to separate love of God from love for people. We love and worship an invisible God but we can still see and hear Jesus speak to us and he has promised "I am with you always until the end of this world." (Matt 28:20) Moreover, every time we attend Mass we have the opportunity for a close encounter with Christ in the Blessed Sacrament, an invitation to join him at his table. Pam Melvey

We are all, at various points in our lives, short on time. Work, family and other commitments can leave us feeling like we have nothing left to give. But, have you ever considered on what there is to gain by volunteering?

Summer Harrison, a young Youth Minister, works every day over several jobs as she studies for her university degree. Still, she makes the time for volunteering, saying helping others makes her feel fulfilled. In fact, she says the gift of volunteering replenishes her and provides her with even more energy to continue with her daily routine.

"Volunteering makes me prioritise over those things," Summer says.

"Work and Uni are things that I feel I must do, but don't necessarily want to do all the time. However, my time spent volunteering has helped me realise, somewhat ironically, how much reward there is in giving selflessly... you see that when you step away from your own distractions and help others."

Sometimes we might feel as though the act of volunteering is too big a task, or that we don't know where to start. Volunteering helps you to know your skills and strengths and discover new skills as you go.

Vynette Shrimpton volunteers as a Special Religious Education teacher in state schools. She was unsure about how her lessons would be structured until she had done her research.

"I'm enriched by sharing my knowledge and passion with the children as I know that I'm handing on something precious that will help them on their faith journey."

Her work with young people is like tending to a precious garden. She plants the seed and helps nourish it with her knowledge, love and joy of the Gospel.

"They know that God loves them and if I can come away seeing that they realize how much they are loved by God then I'm doing my job."

Catherine Kilpatrick has served as a volunteer for more than fifteen years and she knows that teaching SRE has increased her prayer time as she reflects upon lessons that were and lessons ahead.

Helene O'Neil spends a great deal of time working with charitable organisations within the diocese whilst holding a full-time job as Chaplain to the Curia. She says she has witnessed an increase in the demand in need for volunteers across the community, including to help provide Diocesan services such as Special Religious Education.

But, how do you know if you've got something to offer?

Helen says that with various volunteering opportunities available, there is something to suit everyone's skills set and availability and that making an enquiry with Pastoral Ministries is a great place to start.

"Perhaps you may feel as though the skills, experience and expertise that you have is not enough, or that you have nothing to share. But we all have gifts we can share and sometimes that can just be listening to someone in their time of need."

Summer agrees, adding that her vast experiences in volunteering have helped her to assist various causes, but also develop new skills, meet new people and learn about things she would never would have otherwise.

"I am probably the happiest I've ever been when I am helping other people."

The Son of Man came to seek and to find that which was lost.

Jesus entered Jericho and was going through the town when a man whose name was Zacchaeus made his appearance; he was one of the senior tax collectors and a wealthy man. He was anxious to see what kind of man Jesus was, but he was too short and could not see him for the crowd; so he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to catch a glimpse of Jesus who was to pass that way. When Jesus reached the spot he looked up and spoke to him: 'Zacchaeus, come down. Hurry, because I must stay at your house today.' And he hurried down and welcomed him joyfully. They all complained when they saw what was happening. 'He has gone to stay at a sinner's house' they said. But Zacchaeus stood his ground and said to the Lord, 'Look, sir, I am going to give half my property to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody I will pay him back four times the amount.' And Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because this man too is a son of Abraham; for the Son of Man has come to seek out and save what was lost.'

- Q. Where do you see the need for welcome and acceptance?
