### BITE SIZE THOUGHTS ON THE GOSPEL

### Historical Context - My Lord and my God

This extraordinarily clear statement of belief about the divinity of Jesus appears nowhere else in any of the four gospels. Why does the Gospel of John make this statement and not any of the other gospels? It must be remembered that the Gospel of John was the last of the four gospels to be written — at least 20 years after the Gospel of Mark and some 60 to 70 years after the death of Jesus. The early Christians had been cast out of the Jewish tradition and were making sense of how their own beliefs could stand apart from Jewish tradition. With the break from Judaism, Christians felt able to express their developing belief that Jesus was God.

### Have you thought? Those who have not seen

Jesus says to Thomas, 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' That's us! Jesus' words in the gospel are meant for people like us living today. We are not in the position of Thomas and the other disciples who were able to see the risen Lord face to face and so convince themselves of his rising. The gospel recognises that to believe in the resurrection without that physical, personal encounter with Jesus is to be celebrated even more. Happy are we – blessed are we – who have not seen and yet still believe!

### Scriptural context - Not an ending?

The final two verses of today's gospel passage (Jn 20:30-31) read like the conclusion to the whole gospel. They are a statement of finality about the purpose for writing the gospel and something of a blessing for those who read it. Yet, surprisingly, there is another whole chapter that follows this passage that deals with still more post-resurrection appearances. Most scripture scholars believe that the end of Chapter 20 was the original ending of the gospel and that Chapter 21 is a later addition – possibly added by the community for whom the gospel was originally written.

# THE RECENT MENALIVE WEEKEND AT ST JOSEPH'S TORONTO WAS A GREAT SUCCESS.

Just prior to Easter, thirty men gathered at the St Joseph's Community Centre to experience a MenALIVE weekend. They came from Toronto, neighbouring parishes in the Maitland Newcastle diocese, the Central Coast and from Sydney.

The MenALIVE movement originated in Brisbane twenty years ago and it has held over 500 events. It is a ground up program run by laymen for men.

The weekend was presented by four members of the MenALIVE team from Sydney and included men giving testimonies from their lives, small group discussions, singing, prayerful reflection, and there was plenty of time for the participants to relax together and get to know each other.

On the Saturday afternoon we were blessed to have three priests for reconciliation and the weekend concluded with an outdoor mass presided over by Fr Geoff Mulhearn.

The weekend was catered for by the wonderful parishioners from St Joseph's Toronto who cooked and served food for the attendees. This included a barbeque lunch on Saturday, a sit down meal on Saturday evening, plus coffee, tea, cakes, slices, biscuits and fruit throughout the whole weekend.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

The faithful lived together and owned everything in common.

The whole community remained faithful to the teaching of the apostles, to the brotherhood, to the breaking of bread and to the prayers.

The many miracles and signs worked through the apostles made a deep impression on everyone.

The faithful all lived together and owned everything in common; they sold their goods and possessions and shared out the proceeds among themselves according to what each one needed.

They went as a body to the Temple every day but met in their houses for the breaking of bread; they shared their food gladly and generously; they praised God and were looked up to by everyone. Day by day the Lord added to their community those destined to be saved.

### **Second Reading**

### 1 Pt 1:3-9

A reading from the first letter of St Peter

He has given us a new birth as his children, by raising Jesus Christ from the dead.

Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who in his great mercy has given us a new birth as his sons, by raising Jesus Christ from the dead, so that we have a sure hope and the promise of an inheritance that can never be spoilt or soiled and never fade away, because it is being kept for you in the heavens. Through your faith, God's power will guard you until the salvation which has been prepared is revealed at the end of time. This is a cause of great joy for you, even though you may for a short time have to bear being plagued by all sorts of trials; so that, when Jesus Christ is revealed, your faith will have been tested and proved like gold – only it is more precious than gold, which is corruptible even though it bears testing by fire - and then you will have praise and glory and honour. You did not see him, yet you love him; and still without seeing him, you are already filled with a joy so glorious that it cannot be described, because you believe; and you are sure of the end to which your faith looks forward, that is, the salvation of your souls.

### Gospel

Reader:

From the holy Gospel according to John.

All:

Glory to you, O Lord.

Jn 20:19-31

### After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.
For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me.
Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

# FAITH MATTERS: A New Way to Listen

Our Lenten journey is a time for internal and external reflection and deep listening. The Paschal mystery, that is, the life, death and resurrection is revealed to us during this period and Easter brings blessings of new life and fresh beginnings.

In February this year the new Pastoral Placement Participants (PPP) for 2023 and the international clergy who have recently arrived in our diocese gathered one day a week over a six-week period to complete the Introductory to the Clinical Pastoral Education course.

The course is an introduction to the theory and practice of pastoral/spiritual care. It is a qualification required by NSW Health for those wishing to become hospital visitors. It covers such topics as listening skills, empathy, grief and loss, self-awareness, and hospital procedures.

While this course is essential for our clergy who regularly visit hospitals it is a great place for the PPP's to start their time in Pastoral Ministries, as part of the program they will be placed into services such as St Vincent de Paul, Mum's Cottage, Catholic Care, the Refugee Hub and The Mission to Seafarers. Having the skills of active listening are essential when talking to anyone at any time no matter who they are.

Each week I was excited to visit the group to see how things were progressing and to my delight I could see how comfortable everyone was becoming as they started to learn more about each other and form a bond.

After six-weeks family and friends gathered for the group's graduation. It was during the ceremony that each participant reflected on what they had experienced and learnt over the course.

Many reflected on the course heightening the importance of developing relationships and really taking the time to listen. For others it provided a gentle journey of self-reflection and an awakening of awareness of the need to slow down and listen and knowing when to be quiet. The course allowed participants to meet themselves and explore their own reactions and thoughts around some of the hardest things that humans must think about and acknowledge.

# Morgan Owens (PPP) reflects:

"Pastoral Care is more than just making someone feel better with a few kind words. It's not solving people's problems but offering them a calm presence and an empathetic ear. It is a gift to be given, often by the wounded healer; an individual who can sit with others through the depths of their anguish. I have learnt skills that will serve me as I will be doing some pastoral care visits to our local aged care facilities as part of my Pastoral Placement. Being able to undertake CPE with the wonderful clergy members was an honour all by itself. As someone who is relatively new to the church it felt like a privilege to spend time and develop relationships with our clergy. Their theological knowledge added an extra layer of depth to everything we learnt in this course."

### Asher Watters-Cowen (PPP) reflects:

"I have found that this Clinical Pastoral Education course has been extremely beneficial to my development as a Christian. Like many of the opportunities that the Pastoral Placement offers me, I feel that the Introductory CPE course allowed me to greater expand my vocabulary of skills as led by the Spirit. My skills have been developed as an active listener and responder to those I will encounter in my future, both in parish and workplace settings.

The most valuable skill that I have been able to develop in this course is the consideration of overcoming cultural barriers when engaging in pastoral conversations. My peers and cohort from Australia, India, Sri Lanka and Nigeria have highlighted the need to always consider the cultural contexts of those to whom we pastorally attend, and to view the individual, the 'human document', as a person who shares a common humanity with us, and a right to be listened to, and loved as Christ pastorally loves us, can calls us to pastorally love."
