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<u>REFLECTION FOR THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY YEAR A – 8TH</u> <u>JANUARY, 2023</u>

Each year on the feast of the Epiphany we hear this Gospel reading from Matthew. He was the only one of the four Evangelists who recorded the story of the wise men following the star. His account of the first revelation of the Christ child to mankind is very different from that of Luke, which we heard last week. In Luke's account the shepherds, the lowliest of the low, were the first to discover the child. Our nativity scenes and our Christmas narrative have become an amalgam of the two stories. However, we need to remember that these Evangelists were each writing with a different purpose and a different audience in mind.

For centuries the Jewish people had considered themselves to be chosen people of God and the promised Messiah was coming to them, but Matthew's Gospel provides us with a different perspective. Today, on this wonderful feast of the Epiphany, we are celebrating the revelation of Christ, the long-awaited Messiah, to human kind and Matthew's Gospel holds the key for us. Jesus is not only the Messiah of Israel, but the Saviour of the whole world.

The Magi were possibly astronomers and astrologers, who saw a special significance in the appearance of this star. As educated men, they would have been aware of Jewish expectations and so they followed where it led. In their pilgrimage we see the fulfillment of the prophecies of Isaiah: "The nations come to your light and kings to your dawning brightness..bringing gold and incense and singing the praise of the Lord."

Matthew wanted to emphasise the Kingship of Jesus, so it is appropriate that dignitaries from a foreign land should bring gifts to acknowledge the birth of a king. The gifts they brought were symbolic of Christ's destiny: gold representing kingship; frankincense, an aromatic incense, expressing the mystery of his divinity; and myrrh, a bitter incense from a small thorny tree, foretelling the pain and suffering that he is to endure for our sake.

It is especially significant that these first worshippers were non-Jewish and of a different faith. The homage they pay the Christ child provides a stark contrast to the duplicity and hostility of Herod and to the rejection of Christ by so many of the Jews. This is a key focus of Matthew's Gospel, that Jesus was accepted by the Gentiles but not his own people.

In his letter to the Ephesians Paul speaks of the "mystery" that has now been revealed. In Christ, Jews and Gentiles alike have been made the inheritors of His Kingdom. Paul says, "The pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body, and that the same promise has been made to them, in Christ Jesus, through the Gospel."

These scriptures leave us with two questions. Firstly, the Magi

had the star, but what signs do we have to show us the way? Secondly, what gifts can we bring to do homage to our Lord?

And we have the answers! Christ's teachings, recorded in the Scriptures, are a sure guide for us to follow in the way we live our lives. The greatest gift we can give is the gift of ourselves,

as we seek to follow his command to love God and love our neighbour. Whenever we do an act of kindness to someone in need, whenever we reach out to someone who is sick or lonely, we are giving a gift to our Lord.

We have Christ's promise so we live in hope! Pam Melvey

You will have heard of the death of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI on New Years Eve. What a wonderful day to be called home and to begin the next chapter of your journey in faith; one year (chapter) ends and another begins. Our prayers and thoughts go out to not only the wider Church community but also to Benedict's family who will have loved him as a son, brother, grandson, cousin and friend and for whom he was simply Joseph.

A Mass was held in Sacred Heart Cathedral on Wednesday, 4 January 2023 at 6.00pm as we mourn, commemorate and celebrate the life of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI.

We join in unity with all Catholic people around the world who mourn his passing and celebrate his life and lasting legacy.


Born Joseph Aloisius Ratzinger on 16 April 1927, Pope Benedict XVI was the son of a police officer and grew up in regional Germany. Together with his brother Georg, he was ordained a priest on 29 June 1951. As priest and Pope, Benedict faithfully served the Church during his illustrious ministry. During the Second Vatican Council he served as a chief theological advisor to the Archbishop of Cologne, Cardinal Frings. Ordained a Bishop on 28 May 1977 he took the motto 'Fellow Worker in the Truth' and he was elevated to Cardinal in June 1977. In 1981 he was appointed by Pope John Paull II as Prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith.

One of Pope Benedict XVI's greatest achievements was as President of the Commission for Drafting the Catechism of the Catholic Church, a role he held from 1986 – 1992. On Tuesday, 19 April 2005, Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was elected the 265th Pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church, selecting the name Benedict XVI. He resigned as Pope in February 2013, becoming the first Pope to resign since Gregory XII in 1415.

Many of us will remember very fondly Pope Benedict XVI who led World Youth Day here in Australia in 2008. What a wonderful event that was for the Catholic Church of Australia.

Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. May his soul and all the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

You have probably heard how I have been entrusted by God with the grace he meant for you, and that it was by a revelation that I was given the knowledge of the mystery. This mystery that has now been revealed through the Spirit to his holy apostles and prophets was unknown to any men in past generations; it means that pagans now share the same inheritance, that they are parts of the same body, and that the same promise has been made to them, in Christ Jesus, through the gospel.

We have come from the East to worship the king.

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him, 'for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah, for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his

mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

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CHURCH IN AUSTRALIA MOURNS DEATH OF POPE BENEDICT XVI

Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB says Pope Benedict XVI will long be remembered fondly in Australia as the Pontiff who led young people from around the globe in prayer at World Youth Day in Sydney in 2008.

Pope Benedict, born Joseph Ratzinger, led the Church from April 2005 until February 2013, becoming the first Pope in centuries to resign. He had earlier served as head of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, one of the Vatican's most influential departments, for more than two decades.

Pope Benedict died in Rome, where he had lived since his papal retirement, on Saturday evening, Australian time.

"From his time as an expert adviser – or peritus – at the Second Vatican Council onwards, there was no question that Joseph Ratzinger was a major figure within the Church around the world," said Archbishop Costelloe, president of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference.

"His papacy will be remembered as one of rich teaching, including his encyclicals on love, hope and truth, as well as his book series Jesus of Nazareth, and for important reforms in areas like liturgy and in the handling of child sexual abuse."

Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP, the bishop who oversaw World Youth Day in 2008, said Pope Benedict had been a key influence and someone with whom he became close.

"I had the great privilege of spending some private moments with Pope Benedict, away from the spotlight," Archbishop Fisher said.

"They were moments I will forever cherish. He had a great intellect, which he shared through his work as a professor, a Church leader and ultimately as Pope.

"He did not seek nor enjoy the spotlight, but he produced some magnificent works that have shaped and will continue to shape Catholic thought and Catholic life."

Archbishop Fisher said he was very grateful to spend some time with Pope Benedict during his visits to Rome.

"Reminiscing about his time in Australia and learning from this gentle father figure was a real joy," he said.

Archbishop Costelloe said parishes around the country will hold special memorial Masses for Pope Benedict in the coming days, encouraging those wishing to attend to visit local church and cathedral websites for more information.

"These Masses will be a chance to celebrate the life and faith of Pope Benedict, but also to pray for the repose of his soul – just as we do for anyone who has died," he said.

After a hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the premier gathering of young Catholics in Australia will return in December 2024, and the Archdiocese of Melbourne has been named host.

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference last week supported the proposal for the 2024 Festival and expressed its gratitude for the Archdiocese of Melbourne's offer.

"We know what a great source of Christian energy the Australian Catholic Youth Festival has been over the past decade, and we have very much been looking forward to its return," said Archbishop Christopher Prowse, chair of the Bishops Commission for Evangelisation, Laity and Ministry.

"As bishops, we are inspired by the enthusiasm we see in our young people in our local ministry. But we also recognise the great sense of solidarity and fellowship that is evident when thousands of young people gather to share their love for Jesus."

Melbourne Archbishop Peter A Comensoli said he welcomed his brother bishops' trust in the Archdiocese of Melbourne hosting the Festival in 2024.

"The Archdiocese of Melbourne was host for the inaugural Festival 11 years ago. We are excited to have ACYF back, and to start planning how we will welcome young Catholics from around the nation," Archbishop Comensoli said.

"ACYF is a great opportunity for our young Church. It is a real invitation for pilgrims to enter more deeply into their relationship with Jesus and be empowered to be disciples in the world today.

"We will work closely with a national committee to determine a theme, but for the moment I just want to say to young people: put this time in your diaries and start planning your journey!"

More details about the 2024 Australian Catholic Youth Festival will be released later this year.
