That's the challenge all of us face. Our culture, our media, often our bosses, our politicians and our neighbors, all expect us to live by values, that are not those of the Gospel.

We acknowledge the traditional custodians of this land, the Awabakal People who, long before us lived, loved, educated and raised their children on this Country. We pay our respects to Elders past and present and we recognise the young people who are our future. We acknowledge all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families in our communities. 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REFLECTION FOR FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT YEAR A - 25/02/2023

Hearing the story of Adam and Eve in today's first reading reminds me of the little boy who opened the large family Bible with fascination, and looked at the old pages as he turned them. Suddenly, something fell out of the Bible, and he picked it up and looked at it closely. It was an old leaf from a tree that had been pressed in between the pages. 'Mummy, look what I found', the little boy called out. 'What have you got there, dear?' his mother asked. With astonishment in the young boy's voice, he answered: 'I think it's Adam's suit!'

The Genesis story about the origins of sin in the world rewards very careful reading. The serpent promises Eve two things: that her eyes will be opened to know good from evil and that this will make her like God. Such a temptation was irresistible and nothing has changed.

Knowledge is a gift given us by God. I am always grateful for being a Catholic because, along with other long-standing Christian denominations, we highly value scholarship, rational thought and inquiry. As anxious as the Church has sometimes been about scientific investigations, our best traditions are to see God revealed in human thoughts and scientific achievements that ennoble our human family. It is the application of knowledge, or the way it is abused, that can be harmful.

On the domestic front, many families have a 'know-it-all', the relative who has an extraordinary ability to retain facts and figures and who seems to gain a sense of self-worth by correcting us mid-sentence when we get a number, place or fact wrong. He or she can be very irritating. On the world stage we have seen how scientific knowledge can try and seduce us into believing that all scientific achievements are good no matter how unknown the consequences of these choices might be for future generations. Every new piece of knowledge brings with it wonderful potentialities and serious responsibilities.

As this story demonstrates, the temptation to know as much as God has never been more real than it is right now.

One day a group of scientists got together and decided that man had come a long way and no longer needed God. The scientists walk up to God and say, 'God we've decided that we no longer need you. We're to the point that we can clone people and do many miraculous things, so why don't you just go on and get lost.'

God listened patiently and after the scientists were finished, said, 'Very well! How about this? Let's have a woman-and-manmaking contest.' To which they agreed. However God added, 'How about we do this just like I did back in the old days with Adam?' The scientists said, 'Sure, no problem', and bent down and grabbed some dirt. God just looked at them and said, 'No, no, no. You go and get your own dirt!'

Today's Gospel is about knowledge too. Satan knows who Jesus is. His temptations are an attempt to get Jesus to betray his humanity and not endure the limitations of his daily life. Jesus knows that the only way to be true to his divinity is allow us to see it shine in and through his human life. The rejection of the temptation to compromise his frail human frame gives us the hope that we, too, can glimpse the power of God's greatness in every moment we reject the desire to be directors of our own destiny and to see good triumph over evil in the choices we make.

It's a relief to know we don't have to be God!

May this Lent see us do what we are created for: to use all our knowledge to praise, reverence and serve the Loving One who willed us into being. (Extracted From Richard Leonard) Dan Joyce

- Christine Hodyl (From the Diocesan Pastoral Placement Program) PPP has been appointed to the Morisset Parish, for 2023.
- The purpose of this program is to enable participants the opportunity to experience different workplaces and ministries across the diocese. These 'on the ground' ministry work placements help participants explore the opportunities that are available to them to serve God and the local community of the Catholic Church in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle. The Pastoral Placement Program provides participants a year-long discernment journey, involving the see, judge, act method, to make an informed choice about the possibility for future ministry.
- Bishop Michael Kennedy formally the Bishop of Armidale NSW, will be installed Bishop of Maitland Newcastle Friday evening 17th March 6pm Sacred Heart Cathedral Hamilton.

DIOCESAN NEWS-DID YOU KNOW?

The Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle is one of the region's largest employers. The diocese provides pastoral, health care, social welfare, educational and childcare services for the community in the Newcastle, Lake Macquarie, Hunter, Upper Hunter and Manning areas. It represents the Catholic Church extending from Lake Macquarie to Taree and as far inland as Merriwa and Murrurundi. Bishop Michael Kennedy will be the pastoral leader of approximately 150,000 Catholics in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, when he is installed.

The Diocese operates the Catholic Schools Office supporting 44 primary schools, 12 secondary schools, one K-12 school and one special school, educating more than 19,600 students in the region. Catholic Care provides support, assistance and education to all families and individuals, regardless of age, gender or religion through a range of child, youth and family services, foster care, counselling, homelessness, food security and refugee programs. St Nicholas' Early Education operates more than 10 early education centres across the region as well as the Out of School Hours care in Catholic schools. The St Nicholas' pathways program supports study and career options for early education. The parishes and agencies of the diocese are supported by the Chancery (Bishop's Office) and Shared Services team.

2023 PROJECT COMPASSION LAUNCH

Last Tuesday, our SJV Parish Leaders, together with SJV School Students and Staff, joined hundreds of people who gathered at the Sacred Heart Cathedral Hamilton with open hearts and minds for the launch of Caritas' Project Compassion.



The Liturgy of the Word First Reading

Gen 2:7-9; 3:1-7

A reading from the book of Genesis

Creation of our first parents, and sin.

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death".' Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loin-cloths.

Second Reading

Rom 5:12-19

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Where sin increased, there grace abounded all the more.

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift. The results of the gift also outweigh the results of one man's sin: for after one single fall came judgement with a verdict of condemnation, now after many falls comes grace with its verdict of acquittal. If it is certain that death reigned over everyone as the consequence of one man's fall, it is even more certain that one man, Jesus Christ, will cause everyone to reign in life who receives the free gift that he does not deserve, of being made righteous. Again, as one man's fall brought condemnation on everyone, so the good act of one man brings everyone life and makes them justified. As by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by one man's obedience many will be made righteous.

Jesus fasted for forty days and nights.

Jesus was led by the Spirit out into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, after which he was very hungry, and the tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to turn into loaves.' But he replied, 'Scripture says:

Man does not live on bread alone

but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'
The devil then took him to the holy city and made him stand on the parapet of the Temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said, 'throw yourself down; for scripture says:

He will put you in his angels' charge,

and they will support you on their hands in case you hurt your foot against a stone.'

Jesus said to him, 'Scripture also says:

You must not put the Lord your God to the test.'
Next, taking him to a very high mountain, the devil showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendour. 'I will give you all these', he said, 'if you fall at my feet and worship me.' Then Jesus replied, 'Be off, Satan! For scripture says:

You must worship the Lord your God, and serve him alone.'

Then the devil left him, and angels appeared and looked after him.

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LITURGY MATTERS: Rite of Election

You're invited to come to the Rite of Election.

As we, the Church, journey together through the liturgical year we find ourselves in many liminal moments. Very soon we will start together on our Lenten journey towards our celebration of the Paschal Mystery at Easter. Interwoven in this Lenten journey is a liminal moment of great importance in the faith and life of the church. That is the **Rite of Election** of our Catechumens.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is a journey begun by those seeking faith who come to the Catholic community to get to know Jesus and experience the Catholic way of life. The introductory phase is known as the Precatechumenate. When ready, those who wish to continue the journey take the first formal step, celebrated in the **Rite of Acceptance**, where they are 'accepted' into the Order of Catechumens. This marks the beginning of the second period of initiation where the Catechumens undergo a process of prayer and learning about the Catholic way of life which is driven by the liturgical year. Typically, the Catechumenate takes twelve months but may be longer according to the needs of the individual.

The **Rite of Election** closes the Period of the Catechumenate. This rite normally coincides with the first Sunday of Lent. At this time the Catechumens declare their desire for baptism supported by their godparents, sponsors, priests and, indeed, the whole church community. In the presence of the bishop (or delegate) in the cathedral, they sign their name in the Book of the Elect. They are then known as "the elect".

The **Rite of Election** is normally celebrated on the First Sunday of Lent. This marks the beginning of the third stage of the Initiation journey, aptly named the Period of Purification and Enlightenment. This can be a very intense time for The Elect when, accompanied by the community, they deepen their reflection of the Paschal Mystery. This preparation ensures that The Elect are ready to receive the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist) at the Easter Vigil. Once baptised they are known as Neophytes.

It is a surprise to some communities to know that this is not the end of the initiation journey. The Neophytes, still accompanied by the parish community, enter the **Period of Post Baptismal Mystagogy** for the duration of the Easter Season. This time is focused firstly on the readings of the Sundays of Easter and preaching that breaks open their meaning for discipleship now and secondly on reflection on the experience of Initiation. The Neophytes continue to hold an important place in the community for the first twelve months of their life as baptised members of the faithful.

This year we encourage our Church community to come together at 2.30 pm on Sunday 26 February 2023 at the Sacred Heart Cathedral to support and pray for our Catechumens as they become The Elect. For all details <u>click here</u>.

Spanning across the six weeks of Lent each year, Project Compassion brings thousands of Australian schools, parishes and supporters together to raise funds for people living in some of the most vulnerable communities around the world.

Caritas Australia's Impact Director Leigh Matthews said it was great to see so many people there to support the cause

"It was beautiful to have everybody here for the launch of Project Compassion," she said.

"There was a great energy in the room, and I think it really resonated with the people here.

"Project Compassion genuinely has a real impact on individuals – sometimes it's easy to forget that there are people on the other end of our donations. It's an opportunity to consider that there is a person with a real life who is able to change their future with your support."

Director of Pastoral Ministries Teresa Brierley says the event and this year's theme "For All Future Generations" is incredibly important to our Diocese.

She believes that Caritas' <u>stories</u> show how much of an impact a campaign like this can have.

"Project Compassion is important for our Diocese because Caritas are our international overseas organisation. On behalf of the Catholic Church, they help countries in which they mission and provide support when needed," Teresa said.

"It's significant because we often think of our own country in need, but this way, through Project Compassion's stories, you can see the good works they do. They can only achieve that because we support them financially."

One of this year's highlights is Laxmi's story.

After losing her father at a young age, Laxmi was at risk of falling further into extreme poverty. But with the support of Caritas Nepal, Laxmi joined a child's club, became a leader in her school and is now a mentor to other girls in her village.

She lives with her mother and siblings in Jajarkot, one of the least developed districts in Nepal's Karnali province.

Laxmi is just one of 5,000 children that Caritas Nepal has supported, and with our help, they can provide assistance to many more.

Leigh encourages anyone who can contribute, to donate funds to the campaign – she says every dollar will make a difference.

"This Lent, remember that the good you do today will impact the lives of all future generations to come," she said.
