The Word of God today speaks to us about a God of surprises.

In the religious culture at the time of Jesus, people were very aware of being from a tribe, clan, or town. Their ancestral heritage was their identity. So in today's Gospel, when we hear Jesus demanding that disciples must love him over their parents, he was entering into their religious identity, not just their family life.

Immigrants who receive Australian citizenship, take the Naturalization Oath of Allegiance. Today, Jesus gives us a more simplified yet challenging version of his requirements for discipleship, our Christian citizenship, as it were. Our Christian ID card contains not our blood type, and nationality, but the mark of our love and service to others.



Have we ever considered that being a Christian may cost us something? Perhaps we've never asked, or had to ask the question.

We acknowledge the traditional custodians of this land, the Awabakal People who, long before us lived, loved, educated and raised their children on this Country. We pay our respects to Elders past and present and we recognise the young people who are our future. We acknowledge all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families in our communities. We respect their deep physical and spiritual connections to Country through their stories, traditions and living cultures.

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Reflection for THIRTEENTH Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A — 2nd July 2023

Today's Gospel presents to us, in no uncertain terms, the necessary obligations to become true disciples of Jesus.

We are made aware of the CHALLENGES on the road set before us -but also -the REWARDS of true discipleship that are awaiting those who answer the call.

In Matthew's Gospel - Chapter 10 - there is an alternating pattern of narratives & sermons. Here, today, he describes in great detail, Jesus' instructions to his disciples as they set out on their journeys to spread the Good News in their towns & beyond. He depicts the Christian life as being filled with a sense of expectation, but, importantly, his words are directed NOT just to the Twelve, but to ALL who accept the invitation to follow him & proclaim his Gospel.

They must not allow themselves to hesitate when faced with the opposition, persecution, contradictions and violent reactions their ministry is bound to attract. Confrontation is unavoidable. A Gospel that bothers no one & questions nothing is not the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

There is also a strong sense of Church in this Reading, in fact, the Greek word "ecclesia" only occurs here, thus linking the Church with the Kingdom of God.

So, today, we are invited to hear the Lord's word- act upon his command -& learn to do good in our world, as Jesus did. Certainly, "taking up one's cross" is a step further from doing a pious devotion! We also realise that the cross was an instrument of torture & to a certain degree we must be prepared to undergo ridicule & insult as He & his disciples experienced.

Choosing to "carry our cross" may result in division within our families & society- but this is where Jesus sums it up by saying that the challenging nature of his peace is more like a sword. His wishes are for us to treat everyone, particularly the poor, in the same way we treat our family members.

This in itself can cause a rift because sometimes family members expect to receive our special treatment exclusively & are not always happy to receive "shared attention", but there could be times that we may need to take some extra steps in our commitment to his mission.

These are not easy words to read, or easy things to do, but we live with the expectation given to us & try our best, helped & strengthened by the words so frequently spoken by Jesus. " Do not be afraid I go before you".

Let us always remember the reassuring words spoken to us in today's Gospel - "Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me"-THERE IT IS- our inclusion in the Blessed Trinity, the so called "Circle Dance" of the Father, Son & Holy Spirit! What a privileged status we have been gifted.

He is always leading us, how will we follow him? Not even the smallest gesture, like "a cup of cold water" given in charity will go unnoticed. (Matt 10:37-42)

2023 June Parish Pastoral Council Meeting

Items of interest raised at the Parish Pastoral Council meeting during the week.

- The Parish Rental Property at 111 Dora St is finally back in the hands of the Parish. The tenants who had recently attracted the attention of the NSW Police and had not paid rent for some months, after two trips to the 'Tribunal,' were finally evicted with the help of the Sheriff's Office, at the end of last week. The tenants have left the house in a deplorable and uninhabitable condition. The Parish Finance Council will now have to decide on the future of the property.
- With the pending Safeguarding Audit of the Maitland/ Newcastle Diocese to be conducted by (NCSS), Parish Leaders were called to a meeting at the Diocesan Offices recently. Those who attended the meeting were informed of the standards that the auditors will be seeking. Parishes are expected to establish a team of people who keep the Parish community informed about issues relating to the protection of children and vulnerable adults and how safeguarding risks are managed.
- The PPC would like to invite parishioners who are interested in promoting Safeguarding in our parish, to please contact any member of the PPC or the parish Office.
- Change of Visitation Date We have received notification from the Bishops Office, that Bishop Michael Kennedy will now only be in our parish on Friday evening 8th September to confer the Sacrament of Confirmation. He will not be presiding at the weekend Masses as previously reported.
- 2023-aMeN Camino We have been notified by Rose Macalister from the Diocese, that two aMeN Camino pilgrimages will pass through our parish at Cooranbong, in 2023. The first date is set for Monday 10th July, and the second date is Monday 7th August. The vision behind the Hunter based Camino is to bring together people from across the diocese including staff and parishioners to take on a physical and spiritual journey surrounded by God's creation. In total, pilgrims walk almost 100km. Along the way they take in sacred Aboriginal sites in the Wattagan and Glenrock national parks. The pilgrims are provided with insightful glimpses into our Diocese's rich history, including Mary MacKillops visit to Cooranbong. If any parishioners can help on Monday 10th July with welcoming and hospitality, please let the office know, the pilgrims are expecting to arrive around 3pm.

He was determined to improve his opportunities for employment by undertaking studies at TAFE but after he completed the course, he applied for one job after another...after another.

Sadly, when the team recently saw him again, they found out that things had not improved for him.

Pat had been reduced to living in his car with a small annex close to a local reserve. Despite his studies at TAFE, and having submitted 30+ applications, he still couldn't secure a job.

But there he was on the Taree Community Kitchen doorstep, trusting that our team would welcome him with a hot meal.

CatholicCare Director Gary Christensen said Pat's story is just one

Having been buried with him through baptism, we shall walk in a new life.

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life.

But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

Your Prayer Matters

Praying at Mass isn't just something that the presiding priest undertakes. It is something we are all called to do.

You may have seen the title Opening Prayer at Mass or a liturgy. It is more accurately called 'The Collect'. There is an important reason behind this. It is a significant prayer within our Mass or any Catholic liturgy. So, what is it? What is it for? Before we explore those questions, it helps to reflect deeply on a Collect through the process of Mystagogical Reflection.

Mystagogical Reflection

At its heart Mystagogical Reflection is about helping people to open their eyes, their minds and their hearts to the presence of God who is already with them every moment of every day in all of creation and in every human experience.

Mystagogical questions lean into our experience and the mystery of God.

Before you begin it helps to settle your mind and your heart. Breathe deeply and relax. The following song can assist you - Sacred Silence by Tom Booth.

The Collect (for the 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time A)

The Priest, with hands joined, says:

Let us pray.

And all pray in silence with the Priest for a while.

Then the Priest, with hands extended, says the Collect prayer,

Grant, O Lord,

that we may always revere and love your holy name, for you never deprive of your guidance those you set firm on the foundation of your love. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

at the end of which the people acclaim:

Amen.

The Process

- 1. **Encounter:** Read the Collect prayerfully...
- 2. **Reflection:** What word or phrase captures your attention? What did you experience/feel? What is God revealing to you? How does this relate to your life?
- 3. **Catechesis**: What are we learning about our Catholic life and faith?
- 4. **Conversion:** What is Christ asking of you today?

So, now to those questions...

If we look at the word Collect itself, it simply means to be gathered together from the Latin 'collecta'. As noted above, before the Collect is prayed it is introduced with a call to pray -*'Let us pray'*. This is a collective instruction. It is for all who are present. What are we being instructed to pray for? The silence draws us to come into God's presence and then be mindful of our intentions as we present them to God. Done well, through active listening and reflecting, it is a moment where the intentions of the heart speak to and with God. Then, God is openly addressed: 'Grant, O Lord'. The following phrases then highlight the importance of God in our lives. For example, in the Collect above it is reminding us that God guides and loves us. Our petition is through our reverence and love of God in the hope that, as we are set on a 'firm foundation of love', God's guidance will not leave us. Through God's love our

prayers will answered. The Collect then concludes with a Trinitarian ending giving glory to God.

The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* stresses the Collect's importance when it states that it is the Collect "through which the character of the celebration finds expression" (n.54). Therefore, spending time reflecting on the words of any Collect gives us a better interpretation and appreciation of the celebrations purpose. Each Collect has its own particular centre of attention. What is God calling your attention to?

When you next hear 'let us pray', be ready, be present, be attentive. Let God speak to your heart, not just in that moment but throughout the whole celebration.

Church leaders in Australia welcome Synod working document

As the Church approaches the first session of the forthcoming Synod of Bishops, Australian Catholics are being encouraged to continue their engagement with the global synodal journey

through prayer, ongoing discernment and local conversations. **AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS**

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On Tuesday evening, the Secretariat of the Synod published the Instrumentum Laboris, or working document, for the first session of the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops – commonly referred to as the Synod on Synodality.

The first session will take place this October; the second and final session is scheduled for October 2024.

Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB, president of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and a member of the Synod's preparatory commission, said it had been an extraordinary process to get to this point, with Catholics across the world helping shape the working document.

"Countless people have invested their hopes, their prayer, their time and their energy in helping the entire people of God consider how we can share in the mission entrusted by God to the Church," he said.

"This is the latest, and an enormously significant, milestone in a journey which has spanned several years. It represents both an invitation and an opportunity to remain engaged in prayer, reflection and ongoing discernment with all that has emerged so far in what has been an unprecedented worldwide consultation."

Archbishop Costelloe stressed that it will be important, as the Church in Australia is currently doing with the fruits of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia, to consider deeply how the wisdom gathered through this synodal process can be applied in a local setting.

"The unfolding of the synodal journey will offer our dioceses, parishes, schools and other ministries a precious opportunity to consider how they might better carry out in contemporary Australia the mission entrusted to them by the Lord," he said.

"The three central themes for this Synod of Bishops – communion, mission and participation – remain at the heart of this document. We are being invited to adopt them as a fundamental lens through which we can evaluate all we are doing."

National Synod of Bishops coordinator Trudy Dantis said additional resources will be produced in the coming weeks to help the faithful support the ongoing journey.

"In Australia, we have had the benefit of the Plenary Council in coming to better understand these paths of prayer, discernment and, eventually, decision-making," said Dr Dantis, who is director of the National Centre for Pastoral Research.

"We will be encouraging people to take part in a prayer pilgrimage in the weeks leading up to the first general assembly in October, at which we will have several Australian bishops, as well as lay people, present.

"Our national Synod committee will provide material to help groups that have already been formed around the country continue their efforts to see how a synodal Church can be lived out in their context."

The 15 worksheets that are part of the Instrumentum Laboris, and which will guide the work of the Synod assembly in October, will also be useful for local Catholic conversations, Dr Dantis said.

Archbishop Patrick O'Regan and Bishop Shane Mackinlay will attend the Synod of Bishops as the two delegates of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference. Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP will also participate as a member of the Ordinary Council of the Secretariat of the Synod.

Ten other representatives from the Oceania region will also attend the Synod, with those participants expected to be announced in the coming weeks.
