Dear Parish Family,

You will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but

throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.

As a student in the seminary, I was required to teach religion classes in the local state primary school at Manly. One day, I was teaching a class of year fours, and I asked them to draw for me a picture of what the Ascension might look like. Well, most of them did a fairly conventional portrait of Jesus rising up on a cloud or just rising up. However, I remember one of the students, who was a particularly gifted artist, he had Jesus blasting off into the sky with Jesus holding on to a rocket. On the side of the rocket, it had NASA. I asked why a rocket, and he said..."Jesus had a long way to go"!

Since Easter we have been reflecting upon our life, in light of the resurrection and what it means to us. Over the last Sunday's, our gospels had Jesus at the last supper reflecting upon going home and trying to comfort his disciples by talking about the coming of the advocate, the Holy Spirit. He reflected upon the gifts of love and peace and how wondrous but also challenging these gifts are if we are to live these in the world. Now he talks about witnessing to the truth – not many days from now, (you) will be baptised with the Holy Spirit. A baptism that will help, guide and shape the church to proclaim and be the good news to the end of earth and until the end of time.

The author of the gospel of Luke is also the author of the Acts of the Apostles ...this weekend's gospel and first reading. We could say, as one book ends, the other begins as the gospel finishes with Jesus' Ascension and Acts begins with the story of the Ascension. It highlights the life of the disciples after the Ascension and Pentecost telling the story of spreading the good news even further then Jesus was able to do in his earthly life. The Acts of the Apostles really doesn't end at Acts 28.31 (that's the end of that book) because that's all that was recorded. Why? The Acts continues in the same ministry carried on by millions of people just like you and me throughout time and place.

As we conclude Reconciliation Week, the opportunity for reconciliation never ends as we are challenged by the Spirit in the call to love, peace and truth. Reconciliation takes place when we sit at table together, when we listen and not just hear, when we love and are loved, when we bring peace and experience peace, when we forgive and are forgiven. We have come a long way, we can't change our past, but we can acknowledge its hurts and pain and make a better present and future. As Pope St John Paul II once said to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities: You are part of Australia and Australia is part of you. And the Church herself in Australia will not be fully the Church that Jesus wants her to be until you have made your contribution to her life and until that contribution has been joyfully received by others.

As we approach Pentecost next weekend....we will hold our Gifting Sunday asking for you to put up your hand to support the various ministries within our parishes. As St Peter writes....Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received. (1 Peter 4:10) What gift am I already gifting to our community or what could I gift? As we pray come Holy Spirit come.


New Director of Schools for Maitland-Newcastle

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LITURGY MATTERS: Fostering community By Fiona Duque

In the opening paragraph of Sacrosanctum Concilium (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, 1963), it frames for us what is important in our liturgies; that the 'household of the Church' needs to 'foster whatever can promote union among all who believe in Christ' (n. 1). The way I read this is that whenever we come together as the faithful - and not even then if we are truly to live out our baptismal calling of being sacramentally bound in unity linking all the baptised - we come together as a family, one household

Having grown up with two brothers and a middle child, I understand that sometimes this union that is called for can be challenging. But if we begin to look at each other as family, maybe we can try and come together as a community of faith that we are called to be.

Let's look at the Mass – the liturgy above all liturgies. A couple of years ago I wrote an article titled 'Go Forth the Mass is Ended'.

I wrote:

"If we are not full, conscious, and active participants in the liturgy we will not take away the nourishment from the table of God. To be sent into the world as Jesus has commissioned us to, we need this nourishment to be the Body of Christ, our vocation to bring his message to others in our daily lives (cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church (2000), n. 1332). Pope Francis, in his message for World Mission Day 2022, also emphasises this call to mission in response to the dismissal:

Christ's Church will continue to "go forth" towards new geographical, social and existential horizons, towards "borderline" places and human situations, in order to bear witness to Christ and His love to men and women of every people, culture and social status." (n.3)."

In the corporate world they have standard operating procedures and these SOPs assist in ensuring consistency, enhanced quality and streamlined workflow. This language clearly does not work for the Mass, but the ideas do.

They help people stay focused on their mission and avoid unnecessary confusion.

In a similar way, the Church, guided by the Holy Spirit, has given us a sacred structure in the celebration of the Mass. The Order of the Mass—from the Penitential Rite to the Liturgy of the Word, and from the Eucharistic Prayer to the final blessing—is not just a routine. It is a sacred rhythm, a spiritual SOP, if you will, that draws us deeper into communion with God and with one another.

Just as SOPs in business help teams stay aligned with their goals, the structure of the Mass helps us stay aligned with Christ. It ensures that every celebration, whether in a grand cathedral or a humble chapel, is united in purpose, reverent in spirit, and rich in grace. Sacrosanctum Concilium uses the term 'norms'. One norm that I want to share here is this:

"Therefore no other person (other than the bishop – not even a priest), may add, remove, or change anything in the liturgy..." (n. 22.3).

Therefore, let us be mindful of each other, those assembled. Let us not take this structure for granted. Instead, let us enter into it with hearts full of faith, knowing that in this holy 'order', we encounter the living God. Let us not bring anything into the Mass that may cause disunity. Let us not turn Mass into just an inward devotional service, focused on what we want, and our desires. Let us all be full, active, conscious participants together, united in Christ's call on our lives as the Body of Christ.

Planting seeds of faith: The impact of Special Religious Education

"SRE is such a beautiful ministry, in giving up some of your time you will receive so much joy and go on your own journey of faith as you see the Gospel through different eyes."

In classrooms across our Diocese, a dedicated group of volunteers is quietly shaping the faith journeys of children in public schools through our Special Religious Education program (SRE).

It's something that has been running for many years in the Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle with links as far back as the 1860s.

A countless number of young people have taken part with thousands of volunteers teaching lessons over the decades.

Now, SRE sits with the Mission & Evangelisation team with 70 volunteers and more than 1,000 children receiving weekly lessons

"SRE, sometimes known as Scripture, involves volunteers going into state schools and teaching religion to students, spreading the good news of God's love to all children," Children's Ministry Partner Nicki Graham said.

"In our program we mostly teach Catholic children, but we also have a few combined classes where we teach children of multiple faiths.

"For many children, this is the only opportunity they have to receive a religion lesson.

"I think we're incredibly lucky that we have wonderful Catholic schools, but we also have to remember that there are many, many children in state schools who are Catholic or Christian whose parents want them to still learn and know about Jesus."

SRE teachers were recently recognised in NSW Parliament for their good work – Nicki says this is a great sign of support for SRE.

"We are very fortunate to still be teaching in NSW as we are currently the only state that is allowing teachers to go in and teach SRE during school time and this recognition shows that we have support from the government," Nicki said.

"It sends a message to the community that SRE is a valuable and vital part of a child's formation and their wellbeing."

Nicki added that she wants to thank all of our existing volunteers for the part they play in our program.

"Thank you for sharing the joy of the gospel with the children," she said.

"Thank you for the love, the laughter and the creativity that you give to these children —without your dedication and passion for this ministry, so many children may never know how much they are truly loved and cared for by God."

Nicki encourages anyone who is interested in becoming an SRE teacher to reach out.

"It is such a beautiful ministry, in giving up some of your time you will receive so much joy and go on your own journey of faith as you see the Gospel through different eyes," she said.

"The Diocese provides all of the training and resources that volunteers need to be able to go into state schools and teach."

"You will be supported every step of the way."

Join us for the Called & Gifted Discernment Process

We are excited during the Jubilee Year to launch the Called & Gifted Discernment Process in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle

The process is designed to help Christians discern the presence of charisms in their lives. Charisms, or spiritual gifts, are special abilities given to all Christians by the Holy Spirit to give them power both to represent Christ and to be a channel of God's goodness for people.

Discerning charisms communally enables parishes to thrive on the gifts of its people. Far from being "just another program", this is a whole new way to look at our parishes. When charisms are discerned and understood, community members feel empowered, valued and they develop a sense of belonging.

The Called & Gifted™ Discernment Process has been used since 1993 by over 200,000 lay, ordained, and religious Catholics and other Christians around the world and has been incredibly successful in a number of Catholic Dioceses across Australia. The Bishops Commission for Evangelisation, Laity and Ministry will release a national statement on charisms in coming months reenforcing our Diocesan commitment to mission and evangelisation into the future.

Mission & Evangelisation is working directly with the Catherine of Siena Institute to offer the Called & Gifted Discernment Process this year. The process will be facilitated online by professionally trained practitioners based in the USA. In the future, a home-grown team will be trained to lead the process face-to-face at a local level.

The process is broken into three sections:

Part One: During the Called & Gifted™ workshop, you will take the Catholic Spiritual Gifts Inventory. (4 Tuesday evenings 10 June – 1 July 7.30pm-9.00pm)

You will learn:

- The role of every Catholic and of the local parish in the mission of the Church to the world.
- The critical role of charisms in the life and service of other lay Catholics and in the life of the parish or Christian community.
- The signs and characteristics of 24 common charisms.
- How discerning and using your charisms can change your life and the life of others, your Parish, and the world.

Part Two: After going through the introductory Called & Gifted workshop and taking the Catholic Spiritual Gifts Inventory, the second step is to have a one-hour personal gifts interview.

Experienced, CSI-trained gifts interviewers can help you:

- Look at your inventory results
- Listen to your experiences of being used by God
- Recognise patterns in your life that may indicate the presence of a charism
- Choose one charism to discern
- Find a way to "experiment" with that gift in the context of your real life
- Answer your personal questions about specific charisms or discernment

Part Three: Discernment in Depth (4 Tuesday evenings 29July – 9 September 7.30pm-9.00pm)

- Going through the initial workshop and having an interview is all preparation for the real work of discernment. This can be done on your own or in a small group.
- You will now put into practice what you have learned about discernment. You will pick one charism to "experiment with" (two hours a week for a minimum of 6 8 weeks) and

see what God does!

There will be opportunities to share your reflections with others

This will be a significant investment in the people of our Diocese as we grow our confidence in living and sharing our faith with others. Clergy too are strongly encouraged to participate. This is a unique opportunity to journey together as a Diocese and will begin following Pentecost. It is critical that participants are aware of, and fully commit to, the three-part process that involves workshops, a personal interview and in-depth sessions about using our gifts in the world. We will seek to bring the full cohort together face-to-face for reflection a couple of times along the way.

Supporting ourselves and each other through ongoing Natural Disasters

Psychologist and Executive Manager at The Rosewood Centre, Kelly Pavan, highlights the importance of recognising natural emotional responses and seeking support to maintain mental wellbeing while many people across our Diocese face ongoing flood conditions.

Over the past several years, our communities have been deeply affected by a relentless series of natural disasters – bushfires, floods, and severe weather events. For many living in places like Taree and across the broader Hunter and Mid-Coast regions, these events have not been isolated. Instead, they have arrived in waves, one after another – often before the last recovery efforts were fully complete. Alongside these challenges, the community has also weathered the far-reaching impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, with its own health, economic, and social implications, further straining our collective resilience. The cumulative toll of these events has affected not only our homes and livelihoods, but also our sense of safety and emotional well-being.

If you're finding yourself feeling exhausted, overwhelmed, or even numb – know that this is a completely natural response. It is common for people to experience grief, anger, sadness, and confusion after traumatic events.

When we go through highly stressful or frightening experiences, our brains shift into survival mode. The part of the brain responsible for detecting danger – the amygdala – becomes more active, while the areas that help us think clearly and process emotions can become less responsive. This can make it harder to concentrate, sleep, or regulate our feelings. You might also find yourself re-experiencing the emotional impact of previous events, even as you face new challenges. These reactions aren't a sign of weakness –they're the brain's way of trying to keep us safe. Understanding this can help us respond to ourselves and others with more compassion and patience during difficult times.

Some people might feel emotionally flooded, while others might feel disconnected or even guilty for not being more affected. All of these reactions are valid. Everyone copes in different ways and can experience their responses at different times.

In the face of such ongoing adversity, it's more important than ever to care for ourselves and look out for one another. The Liturgy of the Word First Reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Why are you standing here looking into the sky? Jesus has been taken into heaven

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is,' he had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.' Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.' As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'
