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THE ASCENSON- 29 MAY 2022 REFLECTION

This is a very difficult concept to grasp. It is so easy to go into "Fantasy Land" and think of clouds, unknowable land of God, Jesus going home.

I was thinking instead of the impact of Jesus' Ascension on he disciples. How did they feel? We're they bereft? Overwhelmed? Gutted?

I was reading a reflection by Patricia Sanchez and she gave me a new perspective. She began with the story of Mark Twain. When he was a young boy all he wanted to be was a pilot on the Mississippi River. After he ran away from home he paid a captain of a riverboat \$500 to teach him how to navigate the river. Later he was said to have lamented that if he had known what was involved he would never have started.

Even though he mapped and charted every bend, sandbar, island and town on the river, he could not retain all that knowledge and he almost gave up. That was when his mentor came to his help and really taught him to "Read the river".

I think that this is what the disciples felt when Jesus finally left for good. I bet they felt that they were in mid-stream without a paddle! Jesus had told them it was now up to them to bring the Good News to all! Wow! I bet that they were very tempted to give up.

Just as Twain would learn to read the river, the disciples would learn to Read the Signs of the Times. They learnt to read the needs of the human communities they led, and they came to rely on the power of the Spirit which became their mentor.

The Gift of the Spirit only comes when we surrender ourselves to be mentored by the Spirit. To let go of our own ego and listen humbly with the eyes of our hearts. With the eyes of the heart we will be able to wait for Jesus' return by living according to the Gospel principles and by making the spiritual and corporal works of mercy our daily agenda. The eyes of our minds might be boggled by the enormity of the needs surrounding us, if we look with the eyes of the heart we will instead see a brother or sister in need, and we will reach out to help.

It is interesting to note that today's readings give us two versions of the Ascension. In the Gospel of Luke, we are presented with Jesus' ascending to God and concluding his mission on earth. In Acts we are presented with the view of his departure 40 days after his resurrection, this inaugurates the Church's mission.

It is said that we do not have a mission. God has a Missionand God's Mission has a church!

I am heartened today with the thought that, with the help of Jesus' own Spirit, we as a community, as a Diocese, as a Church, will learn to read the river; we will learn to respond to the needs of others. That is how we live God's mission!- Uta

1 June- Belonging, Being and Becoming at St Nicholas-Presented by Caroline McGuinness (Trainer and Assessor, St Nicholas Pathways)

Participants will be introduced to the philosophy and framework that guide practice in St Nicholas education and care settings. We will explore how educators work with young children in their journey to belong, be and become.

8 June- Educating the whole child to support learning and wellbeing- Presented by Renee Tyczynski (Professional Officer [psychologist], Catholic Schools Office)

Learn about how Catholic schools support student wellbeing by ensuring a safe, supported, inclusive environment, where students are engaged in their learning, form positive relationships and develop skills for their future within a faithbased community.

15 June- Social connections and improving senior's wellbeing- Presented by Nicola Rosenthal (Regional Manager, Catholic Healthcare)

DIOCESAN LEADER
SHARES FEARS NOW
VOLUNTARY ASSISTED
DYING BECOMES
LEGAL IN NSW

Maitland-Newcastle Diocesan Administrator, Fr Greg Barker, has shared his fears and sadness that the 'sanctity of life is being diminished'. His statements come on the back of the NSW Parliament passing legislation overnight, which legalises voluntary assisted dying.

"It is a terrible day for our State," Fr Barker said.

Fr Greg expressed a multitude of concerns, including for workers who will be asked to enforce the new laws, which are expected to take up to 18 months to come into effect.

"I fear for those in health care who may be asked to go against their conscience," he said.

Fr Greg added that the passing of the legislation, which will allow terminally ill adults to choose to end their life, may also be used against them.

"I fear for those who may be at the end of their lives and could now be taken advantage of by the unscrupulous, in a final act of indignity and abuse."

Fr Greg also acknowledged the impact that this landmark decision will have on those who have dedicated themselves to providing end of life care.

"I fear for what it says of our wonderful palliative care doctors, nurses and support personnel who have committed themselves to caring for those at the end of their life."

He said that proper and effective palliative care gives death with dignity.

"I fear for those amongst us who view all pain and suffering as a loss of dignity rather than as a gift and grace for those whose vocation it is to love, care and support those who are most in need."

All NSW members of parliament were given a conscience vote on the proposed legislation. After 10 hours of debate, the Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill 2021 passed in the NSW Upper House 23 votes to 15, making the way for it to be passed in the Lower House.

Fr Greg said that communities and leaders are judged on the level of care they offer for the most vulnerable members under their mandate, including the very elderly and ill.

"I thank those who have been a voice against the bill, including elected representatives who voted against it," he said.

"I will continue to pray, as I ask you too, for those who choose leadership; to pray for their intrinsic goodness, for their goodwill and their ongoing commitment to service, service of all," Fr Greg said.

Daniel Lee Chun Wei is part of the Pastoral Placement Program, a PhD student studying at the University of Newcastle who is also from Malaysia. He approached me at the beginning of year with a vision of bringing people together from different cultural backgrounds to celebrate their diversity.

Daniel approached his parish priest Father Christian Onukwugha to discuss what could be done at a local level. Daniel soon learnt about Galilee Monday which is celebrated in different parts of the world including Africa on Easter Monday. For many Christians around the world, Easter Monday is the day they go to meet 'Jesus in Galilee'. This celebration has been interpreted from Jesus' message in the Gospel of Mark and Matthew, where after his resurrection, he told his disciples to go to Galilee where he will meet them.

The parishioners of Wallsend-Shortland gathered on Easter Monday as a community to foster and deepened their relationship and learn about each other's culture. The day began with mass, followed by cultural performances by the various groups including Indian, Filipino, Samoan, Malaysian and Australian. A potluck lunch that included various dishes from various cultures was served. The day concluded with trivia and a song. 

The Liturgy of the Word First Reading

Acts 1:1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Why are you standing here looking into the sky? Jesus has been taken into heaven.

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is,' he

had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'
