REFLECTION FOR FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King, and it is the last Sunday in the Church's 2021 liturgical year.

The Feast of Christ the King was established by Pope Pius X1 in 1925 as a spiritual weapon against what was considered at the time, destructive forces of the age, increasing atheism and secularisation.

Even though we celebrate Jesus as king, we must recognize that he was not a king, according to the ways of the world. His was a kingdom concerned with truth and life, holiness and grace, justice, love, and peace.

The 'kingdom' was in fact the central theme of Jesus' teaching. His way of communicating to his followers was the gospel values, that would counteract the evils in society and lead them to understand God's love and to enjoy happiness in this life and the next. Jesus was no ordinary man. He went out of his way to mix socially with beggars, tax collectors and prostitutes. The scandal Jesus caused in the society of his day, can hardly be imagined by people in the modern world today.

On the day of Pentecost, Jesus' disciples came to realise that they had been given the task to continue Jesus' mission of proclaiming, demonstrating and embodying God's reign. We often speak of the day of Pentecost as the 'birthday of the church,' where the disciples were first called 'Christians'. How they began to see that something new had begun, and they were called to continue this mission in every nation, in every culture and in every period. The church does not have a mission, but the mission has a church. The church comes to be, as the church engages in mission, of going into the world, and be Gods saving, healing, challenging presence.

Pope Francis urges us to be a church where everyone can feel welcomed, loved, forgiven, and encouraged to live according to the Gospel. There must be a space for everyone, especially those who have been hurt, excluded, alienated. The church will be less than what Christ intended it to be, when issues of inclusion and equality are not fully addressed. Whether it be abuse victims, first nation survivors, divorcees, women, or members of the LGBTIQ+ community.

In a world where the rules are often made by the strong and the structures of power favour the privileged, the Church must be true to its founding stories and responsive to the presence of God. It must find ways to promote a community of equals and empower men and women disciples, to share their gifts for human flourishing and the growth of the Kingdom. The Church cannot have a prophetic voice in society if we fail to be a model of equality, where those disadvantaged on account of their race, gender, social status, and disability find permission for a dignified life.

Many years ago, Mohandas Gandhi, the great Hindu religious leader in India who brought about a revolution, and an overthrow of the British empire through active love, not violence, said this about Christianity: 'Christianity has not failed, it's never really been tried'.

As we celebrate our Feast of Christ the King, let us take this opportunity, to revaluate the meaning of being church, and the idea of genuinely trying to follow Jesus. The Church is not to be turned into a museum, which preserves a record of what God once did, but it must engage with what the spirit is doing now, by drawing on the wisdom and life experience of God's people. VOTE TO CHANGE THE PLIGHT OF OUR MOST VULNERABLE

Peak advocacy group Catholic Social Services Australia said increases in income support, more social housing, and a boost to mental health funding are necessary to address the "out of control" demand for homelessness assistance.

The calls come on the back of data Homelessness Australia released last month, which shows the number of Australians with mental health issues seeking homelessness assistance has doubled over the past 10 years.

Between 2019-2020 more than 88,300 people with mental health issues sought homelessness assistance across Australia. This figure was up from 44,700 in 2011-12.

Francis Sullivan, Chair of Catholic Social Services Australia, said the figures are dreadful and calls on federal and state governments for increases to income support, more social housing and a boost to mental health funding.

"These figures show just how dire the situation is for some of our most vulnerable and disadvantaged citizens," Mr Sullivan said.

"Thousands of people across Australia either can't afford or can't access mental health care privately, or through Medicare or hospitals. Layered on top of this is the acute shortage of long-term affordable housing and easily accessible mental health support.

"Together, these two major community failings destined thousands of Australians to miss out on the very basic expectation of a safe and secure roof over their heads."

Mr Sullivan said the doubling of demand for homelessness services indicates how the disadvantaged and marginalised in the community are forced to live.

The Hunter Community Alliance echoes Mr Sullivan's concerns. It plans to raise the issue of rising homelessness in the region at its City of Newcastle Lord Mayor Candidates Forum and Lake Macquarie Mayoral Candidates Forum, to be held this month.

Callan Lawrence is the lead organiser for the Alliance, bringing together diverse community organisations, environmental groups, unions, and religious organisations to advance the common good.

He said that as part of the Alliance's Listening Campaign, held over six months to April 2021, many members had raised concerns about homelessness and housing in the local region.

"We know that while there are a lot of people who are accessing social support, there are also a lot of people experiencing homelessness who are not in contact with service providers," Mr Lawrence said.

"Many people envisage people who are homeless to be middle-aged men who may have mental health problems, or drug or alcohol dependency. However, there are also many older women, students, and working families, for example, who are also experiencing homelessness for short or extended periods of time.

"What we hear is, often those people are not in contact with government-funded services but instead rely on family, friends, or their own means to get by. Those government-funded services are typically the only source of data on homelessness, and so we believe there is a much larger experience of homelessness that isn't reported or widely known. It's a whole-of-community issue and one that's unfortunately on the rise."

The Alliance's discernment period informed the formation of a Research Action Team.

"Given there are local government elections later this year, the Research Action Team put together proposals on a range of issues, including homelessness and housing, which could be adopted at a local level," Mr Lawrence said.

"The proposals around homelessness and housing affordability include the development of rough car sleeping zones where people can safely take refuge in their vehicles if they have no other option; a locker system to enable people sleeping rough to store limited personal belongings; increased data collection and reporting on homelessness and poverty; and the implementation of significant affordable housing targets, and an Affordable Housing Contributions Scheme

Alliance co-chairs will present policy proposals at the online forums and negotiate with candidates to seek commitments to make them happen. A key focus of the discussion will be ongoing collaboration and inclusion of the community in developing solutions.

"They're not silver bullets, but they would enable progressive change."

Death of Bishop Bill Wright

Bishop William (Bill) Wright died on, Saturday 13 November, in Maitland Hospital having succumbed to lung cancer at the age of 69.

Bishop Bill announced his ill-health and confirmed he had submitted his resignation to the Holy Father, Pope Francis, in September this year. Whilst he had confirmed his ill health, the speed of Bishop Bill's death was unexpected. The Diocese offers its prayers and sympathies to Bishop Bill's family.

Bishop Bill was ordained eighth Bishop of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle on 15 June 2011 at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Hamilton.

Acknowledging his death, Rev Andrew Doohan, Vicar General of the Diocese, said "Bishop Bill was a warm, considered and deeply faithful man, he was always dedicated to the people of the Diocese and I know he served as an inspiration, not only for many of our clergy but also those in the places he served. He will be greatly missed."

"Bishop Bill was an active and respected member of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference. He made major contributions to the Church and the wider communities in which he ministered."

Leading the Diocese during a period when it faced the terrible truths of historic child sexual abuse that occurred within the Diocese and the failures of some of its past leaders to protect children from abuse, Bishop Bill was recognised as an important figure in supporting survivors and introducing reforms to help the Catholic Church respond to the issue of child sexual abuse.

Rev Andrew Doohan, Vicar General of the Diocese, said "Bishop Bill recognised the pain of the victims and their families, he acknowledged this and made an abiding commitment to promote the safety, welfare and wellbeing of children and vulnerable adults. Bishop Bill's work to support survivors is part of his legacy."

Bishop Bill's funeral due to COVID restrictions is invite only and will be held at 10:30am on the 24th November, the Diocese is looking at setting up livestreaming for Parishes.

BACKGROUND:

Most Rev William Joseph Wright BTh, BA(Hons), DD Bishop of Maitland-Newcastle

Bishop Bill was born in Washington DC in the United States, before his family returned to Australia when he was young. He was educated by the Sisters of Mercy at Pymble and by the Jesuits at St Aloysius' College, Milsons Point, with two years at Wimbledon College, another Jesuit school, when his family was posted to London, England.

He was educated for priesthood at St Columba's College, Springwood (1971-73) and St Patrick's College, Manly (1974-77).

Bill Wright was ordained to the diaconate in October 1976 and to the priesthood on 20 August 1977 at St Mary's Cathedral. After ordination, he gained a BA(Hons), largely in History, at Sydney University.

He has served the parishes of Stanmore, Mount Druitt, Fairfield, Enmore, Dulwich Hill, Bonnyrigg, Moree, Sutherland and Liverpool. In addition, Bishop Bill was Vice-Rector of St Patrick's College, Manly (1985-1991) and Assistant Secretary to the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, in Canberra, in 1995.

Bishop Bill was ordained eighth Bishop of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle by the former Archbishop of Sydney, Cardinal George Pell, on 15 June 2011 at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Hamilton.

Since his ordination as Bishop, he has served as the Co-Chair of the National Committee for Professional Standards. He was a member of the Truth Justice and Healing Council throughout its existence (2013-18). He has been a member of the Bishops Commission for Church Ministry and the Bishops Commission for Ecumenism and Inter-Religious Relations and was a member of the Bishops Commission for Evangelisation Laity and Ministry and the Bishops Commission for Social Justice, Mission and Service. He was Chair of the Bishops Commission for Professional Standards and Safeguarding.

Bishop Bill submitted his resignation to the Holy Father, Pope Francis, in September 2021.

Bishop's Synod on Synodality | November 2021 - February 2022

In March 2020, Pope Francis announced that the theme for the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops would be "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission".

The journey towards the celebration of the Synod in October 2023 was opened at the beginning of October 2021 in Rome, and subsequently in each particular Church. Pope Francis invites the entire Church to reflect on a theme that is decisive for its life and mission: "It is precisely this path of synodality which God expects of the Church of the third millennium. This journey, which follows in the wake of the Church's 'renewal' proposed by the Second Vatican Council, is both a gift and a task."

Mystagogical reflection meets us where we are. No preparation is needed. It's about being open to encountering Christ so we can live from Christ. It's deeply personal and communal.

During Advent, our hope is that anyone and everyone will gather a circle of people to reflect on the Advent gospels using *Waiting with Purpose*, our diocesan Advent Reflection Resource.

Parishes and schools may like to schedule some gatherings to capture those who are not able to form a group. Pastoral Ministries will host four such opportunities across each week of Advent

Enrol in the Christian Formation Course

The Christian Formation Course (CFC) has run in different locations and in different formats across the Diocese since 1996, and has been responsible

for the ongoing faith formation of some two hundred people.

The delivery of the CFC has been revised over the years in an effort to accommodate the demands on people today. It currently runs on a Tuesday evening for 40 weeks of the year.

As the course is coming to an end for the 2021 cohort, we asked the group to respond to several questions about why they chose to study this course, what they enjoyed, would they recommend the course and how the course has impacted their life and enriched their faith.

Why did you study the Christian Formation Course?

"As a lifelong Catholic, having mostly absorbed this faith's practices and culture, I'd come to question my level of belief and conviction. I knew very little about the principles or history of my faith tradition, so I was looking for a grounding in knowledge of Christianity-Catholicism. That is a big subject, so the introductory Christian Formation Course was the right start for me." (Sharon Murphy)

"I wanted to get a deeper insight into my faith before I started working in the Catholic schools. I wanted to discover and have questions answered that I had about my own faith, as well as unpacking why Catholicism in a school makes such a great community. I wish to emulate these values in my teaching style." (Thomas Fairleigh)

"I am so grateful that I participated in the Christian Formation Course this year. It has provided clarity around aspects of my faith that I was questioning and opened a whole new way of looking at things which resonate with who I am. As a result, it has brought about a level of healing which has helped me to feel comfortable with being Catholic." (Mary Sultana)

"I have worked for the CSO for 11 years and I have loved the gentleness, the prayer and the community. I also enjoyed attending liturgies and going to Mass in the Cathedral but I never knew what was going on. I wanted to know more about Catholicism and I wanted to understand what we're teaching children in our Catholic schools. The Church has not had good press and I often felt conflicted about working for the Diocese." (Jenny Scepanovic)

What did you enjoy most about the course?

"The course is introductory. It dipped into the history, principles and mission of the church - from the ancient to the contemporary, from the global to the local, from the good and the bad – and it gave me the tools to find out more. And not just about this faith – I learned a bit about myself as well. The Christian Formation Course helped me broaden my outlook." (Sharon Murphy)

"I enjoyed most discovering how people had influence the life of the church and its beliefs, separate to only learning about just the bible and its stories." (Thomas Fairleigh)

"I have gained knowledge and understanding in how to read the bible, stories of the New and Old Testament, history of the church, Vatican II, the structure of the church and sacraments." (Mary Sultana)

"The best thing about the course was being able to dedicate three hours a week to thinking about the big questions! Life, the universe, God, and everything! The group was a lovely bunch of people of all different ages, and we enjoyed each other's company. I loved all of what we learnt: From Unit 1 where we learnt about the science of the brain and how we are made for relationship, to learning how to read the Bible, to the ancient and modern history of the Church, to our relationship with our planet, to the rites and rituals and Sacraments. It's exactly what

I needed to know, and I feel it has filled in that jigsaw piece that was missing in my understanding of what religion means to people." (Jenny Scepanovic)

Would you recommend studying the Christian Formation Course?

"The Christian Formation Course was developed in this Diocese. It's introductory level, well-established and theologically solid. The course is relevant to any generation – baby boomers to millennials. We all had a'ha moments of debunking myths about our faith. Over a year the cohort learns and grows together and creates a bond which is a lovely bonus. It's a one-year course which is long enough to get a good grounding yet short enough to enjoy seeing it through." (Sharon Murphy)

"I would recommend this course! This course is at a foundational level so anyone can apply and have no trouble understanding it. It really can answer (and create more) questions about faith." (Thomas Fairleigh)

"Yes, definitely, because it is deep and detailed, is wonderful stuff to learn about, and moves you forward in your faith formation journey. I think it would be a perfect starting point for people who want to work in roles in the Diocese. It's not academic so there's no pressure." (Jenny Scepanovic)

"The Christian Formation Course has helped me to better discern what I hear about church doctrine and practice. I now have a better appreciation of scripture since studying the gospel writers and can apply context to Old Testament stories, which has enriched my prayer life." (Sharon Murphy)

"The CFC has enriched my faith by allowing me to understand why people believe what they do, and uncovered all the actions/beliefs that make us catholic. This, as a result, has enriched my life as I feel more comfortable working in Catholic education with this knowledge." (Thomas Fairleigh)

"I have gained knowledge and understanding in how to read the bible, stories of the New and Old Testament, history of the church, Vatican II, the structure of the church and sacraments. If you are struggling with aspects of your faith and are looking to gain some greater understanding and insights, this form of adult education can help you answer those questions that you have been carrying with you." (Mary Sultana)

"I have never dedicated so much time to my spirituality or learning about religion and I will never live my life again devoid of prayer and reflection and awareness. It has solidified my beliefs and connections, given me strength and courage." (Jenny Scepanovic)

Why do you think someone should enrol in this course?

"If you've ever been asked what Catholics believe and felt unsure of giving a reasonably sound answer, then the Christian Formation Course will provide you with a basic, solid foundation of knowledge in a relaxed learning environment." (Sharon Murphy)

"If you want to learn more about your faith, and get a taste of theology without being overwhelmed, than this course is for you!" (Thomas Fairleigh)

"If someone is looking to explore their faith more or has recently discovered a love of God and is looking for a community to worship with but are not sure that Catholicism is for them, this is the perfect course." (Jenny Scepanovic)
