Did You Know?

Advent

The word, "advent", simply means "coming". In the context of the Christian faith, it represents our celebration of the first coming of Christ and our anticipation of his second coming. The birth of the Messiah was promised in the Old Testament and was anticipated by God's people for a very long time.

Traditionally, Advent is celebrated during the four Sundays before Christmas Day. During those four Sundays, many churches and families will mark the days by lighting Advent candles or an Advent wreath.

Having a physical symbol of this anticipation can help keep our minds on what it means for Jesus to be born. Physical representations of these moments act as reminders to us all. When we wait it means what we hope for has not yet come. It has been promised, or we have reason to believe it is on its way, but it is not yet here. We anticipate it and we actively look for it, but we wait.

With A Light Heart

A husband and wife came for counselling after 15 years of marriage. When asked what the problem was, the wife went into a passionate, painful tirade listing every problem they had ever had. Hope can be defined in different ways, a feeling of expectation and desire for a particular thing to happen, grounds for believing that something good may happen, or a feeling of trust. As a noun, hope can mean an aspiration, desire, wish, expectation, ambition, aim, plan, dream, longing, yearning, craving and as a verb hope can mean to expect, anticipate, look for, wait for, be hopeful of, want, wish for, dream of. Everyone knows what it is to hope.

We can know things. The Greek word Ginosko which is most often translated as "know" or "known" is a word that means so much more than that. In English the best way to translate it would probably be to personally, intimately, and experientially know something.

When we consider Christmas, we're not just talking about waiting for the baby Jesus to be born, we know that happened 2,000 years ago. We are welcoming the Christ that is forever being born in the human soul and into history. Jesus took flesh in his birth, he was born the same way as you and I, His birth reveals his earthly existence and brings all humans into a common family, this we know. But what we yearn for is a knowing that is in the heart of each person, a hope that dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring. "Hope does not disappoint, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Rom 5:1-2.5). This interplay of hope and waiting makes us see clearly that the Christian life is a journey calling for moments of greater intensity to encourage and sustain hope as the constant companion that guides our steps towards the goal of our encounter with the Lord Jesus.

This year as we prepare ourselves for the new liturgical year and season of Advent, we also prepare ourselves for what is to come in the 2025 Jubilee Year, Pilgrims of Hope.

Pope Francis writes:

"In our fast-paced world, we are used to wanting everything now. We no longer have time simply to be with others; even families find it hard to get together and enjoy one another's company. Patience has been put to flight by frenetic haste, and this has proved detrimental, since it leads to impatience, anxiety and even gratuitous violence, resulting in more unhappiness and self-centredness.

Nor is there much place for patience in this age of the Internet, as space and time yield to an ever present "now". Were we still able to contemplate creation with a sense of awe, we might better understand the importance of patience."

This Advent let us make room as we await with hope. May the power of hope fill our days, as we await with confidence the coming of Jesus. Through our witness, may hope spread to all those who anxiously seek it so it becomes more than just words but a fully lived experience.

Awaiting Hope is a Diocesan resource that invites all members of the community to gather a circle of people – family, friends, colleagues, ministry teams to reflect mystagogically on the Advent Gospels. This is an opportunity to encounter Christ where we are, to pay attention to what Christ reveals in the scripture and the living tradition of our faith, to share this, to connect it to our life now and to be changed by it.

'Blood, sweat and prayers': St Mary's Catholic College celebrates milestone

This story was originally published in the Newcastle Herald. Catholic Schools Office PUBLISHED November 26, 2024 When the Sisters of St Joseph were asked if they could establish a school for East Lake Macquarie, there was no hesitation. They said ves.

This year St Mary's Catholic College, Gateshead is celebrating 60 years since its doors were opened in 1964.

School ministry coordinator De-Anna Addicoat says when she looks at the students of the school, she is looking at the answered prayers of the Josephites.

"They weren't given any money or land, they just did it through blood, sweat and tears and a lot of prayers," she said.

"I look at these students today and I'm looking at the sisters' prayers and their dreams. What I see today is their dream come true."

In the past 10 years Ms Addicoat has seen the college transition from a year's 7 to 10 school, expanding to accommodate year 11 and 12 in 2019.

"With that came the name change from St Mary's High School to St Mary's Catholic College," she said.


"We also changed the school crest to an updated version and our uniforms became more formal."

When the school first opened, it was an all girls high school with just 156 enrolments. It became a co-ed school in 1983.

"When it was a seven to ten co-ed school the numbers went up to nearly a thousand but it couldn't be maintained because they really didn't have the buildings to accommodate, so numbers dwindled down to five or six hundred," Ms Addicoat said. Since expanding to senior years, there is now a waiting list for 70 students to attend the college in 2025.

"To be able to accommodate the need of people wanting to come to this school we're going from 180 in year 7 to taking 210. The demand is going to take us up to a thousand or so again now," she said.

The school community came together to celebrate the milestone on Friday, November 22 with a mass and array of fundraising activities for the St Vincent De Paul Christmas Appeal. Students also made crosses to represent each of the six decades. "It was a great celebration of love, faith, courage and community," Ms Addicoat said.
