



THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER YEAR A 23 APRIL 2023

Today's Gospel takes us on the road to Emmaus, where Cleopas and his friend were slow to recognize Jesus in their midst. They walked and talked the whole day with Jesus. It was not until that night that they discovered him at the breaking of the bread.

We are the Church of the Second Chance. This second chance is evident even in the first years of the church. Peter denied Jesus. Thomas didn't believe. Paul was temporarily blinded, before he could see clearly.

Like on the road to Emmaus, Jesus is there for us if we can just open our minds. A mind, like a parachute, only works when it's open.

The disciples were transformed into positive people and agents for change, not because their circumstances changed but because they began to appreciate the Christian way of life.

Life is fully and fruitfully lived when it can make a difference to others, that it can transform society, and make it into a mirror of God's Kingdom.

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REFLECTION FOR 3RD SUNDAY OF EASTER 23 APRIL, 2023

A quote from the American Farmer's Almanac said

"A mind, like a parachute, only works when its open."

The disciples travelling on the road to Emmaus, were bogged down with grief and fear!

One commentator described the story as a play with three acts:

Two sad disciples trudging down the road, talking about what they had witnessed.

They meet a stranger who gives them hope.

They recognise him and race back home to tell everyone.

They begin locked into themselves, like a closed parachute, rehashing what they had seen and heard, their fears and disappointment. Then they meet the "stranger" and as he speaks to them, slowly their minds are opened. They begin to see what they had missed. Possibilities begin to emerge and their hearts, which were like stone in their chests with grief, began to burn again with hope and life.

Being rather thick skulled, it wasn't until Jesus broke the bread that they "Got" it.

Then they were transformed from downtrodden and fearful men to enthusiastic disciples who almost ran back to the Jerusalem they had feared before.

This story is so positive! Jesus knew that they didn't get it! Jesus knows that we don't get it!

Yet through it all, he is patient, caring and teaching us. We always have a second, third and fourth chance. As long as we remain open and allow his word to come into us and transform us

Each time we come to Mass and hear God's Word and receive the body of Christ at the table of the altar, we are inviting transformation. Just like the disciples, we come as we are, enthusiastic, bogged down, worried, sad, we bring ourselves to God trusting in his Word and Body to get us through the next week, and hopefully show us how to live with his vision. Each time we come, we hopefully get a bit better at being open, and receptive of his grace and love.

I believe that our God is one of "Second Chances". Like Clopas and Thomas, Peter and Paul, who just did not get it one way or another, we are called to our second chance at each Liturgy.

Our Liturgy begins with an admission of our sinfulness. Before we receive holy Communion, we confess that we are not worthy. But we dare to go ahead, claiming another chance.

May this Easter be a transforming experience for us, letting us accept our own second chance of life in the love of Jesus and each other. Uta France

PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL

The Parish Pastoral Council met on Thursday. Items of interest raised were:

The National Catholic Safeguarding Standards Committee, propose to audit parishes in September. The audit will be investigating parishes for compliance with church and state legislation. The National Catholic Safeguarding Standards comprise 10 Standards, providing the framework for Catholic Church entities to build child-safe cultures and to advance the safety of children and vulnerable adults across the Catholic Church in Australia. The first phase of implementation of the Standards focuses on safeguarding practices for the protection of children, considering the guidance of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse and the National Organisations. Principles for Child Safe

Another item for discussion was the request by some parishioners for the reintroduction of monthly 'cuppas. If this is to recommence, assistance would be required. If you are willing to help, contact a member of the PPC.



The Liturgy of the Word First Reading

Acts 2:14, 22-33

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

It was impossible for him to be held by the power of Hades.

On the day of Pentecost, Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd in a loud voice: 'Men of Israel, listen to what I am going to say: Jesus the Nazarene was a man commended to you by God by the miracles and portents and signs that God worked through him when he was among you, as you all know. This man, who was put into your power by the deliberate intention and foreknowledge of God, you took and had crucified by men outside the Law. You killed him, but God raised him to life, freeing him from the pangs of Hades; for it was impossible for him to be held in its power since, as David says of him:

I saw the Lord before me always, for with him at my right hand nothing can shake me. So my heart was glad and my tongue cried out with joy: my body, too, will rest in the hope that you will not abandon my soul to Hades nor allow your holy one to experience corruption. You have made known the way of life to me, you will fill me with gladness through your presence.

'Brothers, no one can deny that the patriarch David himself is dead and buried: his tomb is still with us. But since he was a prophet, and knew that God had sworn him an oath to make one of his descendants succeed him on the throne, what he foresaw and spoke about was the resurrection of the Christ: he is the one who was not abandoned to Hades, and whose body did not experience corruption. God raised this man Jesus to life, and all of us are witnesses to that. Now raised to the heights by God's right hand, he has received from the Father the Holy Spirit, who was promised, and what you see and hear is the outpouring of that Spirit.'

To indicate the end of the reading, the reader acclaims: The word of the Lord.

Second Reading

1 Pt 1:17-21

A reading from the first letter of St Peter

The ransom that was paid to free you was the blood of the Lamb, Jesus Christ.

If you are acknowledging as your Father one who has no favourites and judges everyone according to what he has done, you must be scrupulously careful as long as you are living away from your home. Remember, the ransom that was paid to free you from the useless way of life your ancestors handed down was not paid in anything corruptible, neither in silver nor gold, but in the precious blood of a lamb without spot or stain, namely Christ; who, though known since before the world was made, has been revealed only in our time, the end of the ages, for your sake. Through him you now have faith in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory for that very reason – so that you would have faith and hope in God.

To indicate the end of the reading, the reader acclaims:

The word of the Lord.

All reply:

Thanks be to God.

Gospel

Reader:

From the holy Gospel according to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Lk 24:13-35

They recognised him at the breaking of the bread.

Two of the disciples of Jesus were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him. He said to them, 'What matters are you discussing as you walk along?' They stopped short, their faces downcast.

Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, 'You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.' 'What things?' he asked. 'All about Jesus of Nazareth' they answered 'who proved he was a great prophet by the things he said and did in the sight of God and of the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have gone by since it all happened; and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, and when they did not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive. Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.'

Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe the full message of the prophets! Was it not ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory?' Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself.

When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. 'It is nearly evening' they said 'and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them. Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?'

They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, 'Yes, it is true. The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon.' Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.

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Field of flowers to support survivors

More than 8,000 ribbon flowers have been planted on the grounds of Sacred Heart Cathedral in Hamilton and Christ Church Cathedral in Newcastle, as an extension of the Loud Sky exhibition.

The exhibition, which runs until 21 May 2023, expresses the stories of survivors through contemporary art. These stories were uncovered through the Royal Commission into institutional response to child sexual abuse in the Hunter region in 2016.

All 8,000 ribbon flowers were handmade by members of the community including secondary students from St Pius X Adamstown and St Francis Xavier's College, Hamilton, parishioners and church members, survivors and their families and friends.

Local artist and art historian, Dr Rod Pattenden, who cocurated the exhibition with Dr Kath McPhillips and in collaboration with the Clergy Abused Network (CAN) and the Lock-Up exhibition space, said the flowers are a sign of hope and an expression of grief.

"The ribbons are being planted in a festive, beautiful, artistic, creative way. And I think for all the hundreds of people who made them, they're expressing a range of emotions and just memorializing, remembering, and celebrating people's lives," said Dr Pattenden.

"I hope it's a reconciling action, a place to visit to see beauty and to remember the complexity of this story."

Magda Mycak, Manager of Zimmerman Service, a healing and support service for survivors, coordinated volunteers to make and plant the ribbon flowers.

"The Field of Flowers installation at the Catholic and Anglican cathedrals is significant because it acknowledges what happened and highlights that it is an issue that is not historical, as survivors live with the impact every day," said Ms Mycak.

"I hope this installation helps spread awareness in the community."

Sod Turning Ceremony marks start of works at new Chisholm Chapel

This morning to mark the commencement of works for the new Chisholm Chapel and the next stage of the Chisholm educational precinct expansion, Bishop Michael Kennedy and CEO Sean Scanlon turned the first sod as part of a ceremony to celebrate the start of construction.

The Chapel will be located at the heart of the Chisholm education precinct and will be an inclusive and dedicated space for prayer and liturgy. When completed, the Chisholm Chapel will be a circular building with the Stations of the Cross displayed on its undercover exterior, landscaped gardens, a reflection pool and the statues of St Bede, St Aloysius and Mary.

The chapel, which is being constructed in partnership with Richard Crookes Construction has been in planning for some time with the late Bishop Bill Wright helping with aspects of the design, including the circular building, the landscaping and it being open without fences to promote inclusion. Once constructed the chapel will be a dedicated intimate space for prayer and for liturgy at the heart of both St Bede's Catholic College and St Aloysius Primary School.

In addition to the chapel, further works commencing at St Bede's Catholic College include a multi-purpose sports hall, performing arts studio and technological and applied science workshop facilities.
