



#### SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER YEAR C SUNDAY 24TH APRIL 2022

In the Gospel today we hear how the disciples had gathered in fear in the upper room. The Church today is not unlike the Church gathered in that upper room of old. In many ways, we the Church, are also in a state of confusion and uncertainty. The changes around us may not be as dramatic as affecting the disciples in Jerusalem, but in venturing into the unknown. There is a sense in which the Church finds itself in uncharted territory. Hopefully the Plenary Council, will not yearn for, or hold onto the security of institutional power.

The disciples humbled by their own failings learned to trust and to walk the pathway of vulnerability. It was their faith in

Jesus, not the size of their numbers, not the strength of their resources, that determined the outcome of their mission. In fact, the Church was born out of vulnerability. It had nothing to rely on, but the power of the risen Lord.

Like the first Christian community, let us choose to be a place where everyone experiences divine hospitality, kindness and generosity. As we share at the table of God's plenty, let us endeavour to reflect his goodness to us in the way we care for one another, especially those in need.

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## **REFLECTION FOR THE 2ND SUNDAY OF EASTER - YEAR C**

What a wonder-filled Easter celebration we have had after all the restrictions of these last two years! There was the commemoration of the Last Supper, the solemnity and sorrow of Good Friday, the very special Vigil and the joy of Easter Sunday. At this point, on behalf of us all, I would like to say a huge "Thank You" to Uta and John France for the preparation and implementation of the inspiring liturgies we have experienced.

In John's Gospel we hear how the risen Christ appeared to his disciples, showed them his wounds and commissioned them to continue his work. His breath filled them with the Holy Spirit but Thomas was not there. He would not believe without a personal experience of Christ! Eight days later, when Christ appeared again, Thomas was able to touch his wounds and, with this experience, came a profound realisation of Christ's divinity, which he expressed in these words, "My Lord and my God." No one before him had truly appreciated who Christ was — not just a prophet or the promised Messiah, but his God. We are called to take this on faith. Christ gave us his blessing and encouragement when he says to Thomas, "You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe."

For more than two thousand years he has been known as "doubting Thomas", an expression that has been incorporated into our language to describe a sceptic, who refuses to believe something without personal experience. Yet, so great was Thomas' faith conversion, he spent the rest of his life preaching Christ's Gospel, travelling as far as India, where he was apparently martyred. It is human to have doubts, to question, and at times we struggle to hold our faith, especially when life is hard. As a result, we need to nurture our faith continually, to find ways to deepen our relationship with God. This may be in sharing our liturgies in community, by reaching out to those in need, in reading the scriptures, in small groups or in private prayer.

On Easter Sunday Father John pointed out that the Resurrection is not the end of the story. Each one of us, like Christ's disciples, has a role to play. We were challenged when he said, "Life is a constant conversion, a continual work in progress." He reminded us of Christ's promise, "I am with you always" and of the fact that the risen Christ is within our very selves. We see the inspiration of the Spirit in the followers of Christ after his death, as their preaching and the cures they brought about converted many. Just like the disciples after Pentecost, we have the Spirit with us as we seek to continue Christ's mission.

The apocalyptic vision of John also highlights for us Christ's divinity, his victory over suffering and death and, as faithful disciples, we can share in that victory.

This prayer from our Sunday Missal may well be a good way to end our reflection today: "May the risen Christ come to us, as he came to Thomas. May we in turn express our faith by being ambassadors of mercy and reconciliation."


#### ANZAC DAY.

We pay grateful respects to those who sacrificed their own lives for others, for our country, and ultimately for the sake of a better world. We remember the pain of those who grieved their deaths and whose lives were changed forever by their wounding.

Convinced that war is the greatest human misfortune, we pray for its elimination from the world. We pray for those who have died in the theaters of war, whether they are on "our side" or the "enemy".





#### LITURGY MATTERS: EASTER IS MORE THAN A DAY OR THREE

While the world thinks Easter is done and dusted, we Christians know it has only just begun its fifty-day trajectory through to Pentecost Sunday.

Holy Week prepares us for the celebration of Easter. Our diocesan Chrism Mass is a big part of that week and this year, with relaxed pandemic restrictions, the Chrism Mass was back. There were more than 300 people who gathered and once again lifted the roof from the Cathedral with the volume of our prayer and singing. People were so happy to catch up again. How good it was to have a face-to-face conversation with people from Taree and Branxton and Singleton and Merriwa and Scone. The pictures in the accompanying gallery convey the experience far better than words.

The Chrism Mass is always a great preparation for the Easter Triduum which is, of course, the main event. Over the three-day liturgy, we don't just recall something that happened 2,000 years ago. We re-member and celebrate Christ's paschal journey from life, through death to resurrection. In the liturgy, Christ's Paschal Mystery is a present reality in which we participate. It is as meaningful, shocking, and life-changing for us today as it was for the first Christians. As Eamonn Bredin puts it so powerfully:

The resurrection event is neither reported nor described in the Scriptures. It is first and foremost a matter of faith; not an occurrence that can be observed, a reality more real than the observable. For the early Christian community the resurrection was not a dogma to be believed but a daring, decisive, power-filled call to live as Jesus lived; a distinctive way, the way of kingdom obedience.

Thus in the mystery of the resurrection: we are not faced with something over and done with, something imprisoned in the past, but an intensely present reality... 1

I don't know about you but my experience of the present reality of the paschal mystery is not lineal but rather a constant cycle of dying — rising experiences through every day. Interestingly, in the Triduum, I often find myself stuck in the Garden of Gethsemane, not ready to move on to Good Friday. Or stuck at the foot of the cross on Good Friday, not feeling at all ready to celebrate the resurrection at the Easter Vigil or on Easter Sunday morning. This is the very wisdom of liturgy. It rehearses me in the steps from death to new life so that I know when I am sitting at the foot of the cross in my everyday life, that I can have 'sure and certain hope' that this is not the end.

When I am in agony and feel totally alone ...

When I am betrayed ...

When I feel spat upon and humiliated ...

When I am the victim of fabricated stories and falsehood ...

When I am in denial ...

When I am scourged by the insults of others ...

when I feel like a laughing stock ...

When I fall down, once, twice, three times ...

When I feel I am carrying the weight of family or the world on my shoulders ...

When I am stripped of everything I hold dear ...

When I thirst ...

When I am hung out to dry ...

When I feel dead and buried ...

In all these moments that continue through Easter and all of life, I recognise that I am in the reality of the paschal mystery, and I know deep within that this is not the end and that new life will come. This is our faith, the source of our hope. This is

what the liturgy teaches me. This is why we never celebrate Good Friday apart from the Triduum. 'The people that lived in darkness have seen a great light!' [Mt 4:16]

As Ralph Kuehner and Joseph Juknialis have pointed out

resurrection happens whenever love transforms life; when someone offers forgiveness despite a burning desire for vengeance; when a nation begins to value and protect the rights of all, not just a few; when the poor, hungry, homeless and disenfranchised are attended as brothers and sisters; when immigrants and refugees are not left to drown or incarcerated but are welcomed as the children of God.2

How do we keep up the pace, not only for the fifty days of Easter but for the marathon that is the 'distinctive way of kingdom obedience?' Well, the Church's equivalent of a gym or training program is Sunday liturgy.

Those parishes who host the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) know the Easter Season is the period of Post Baptismal Mystagogy when the parish community accompanies those initiated at Easter as they reflect on their experience of initiation to draw out its meaning for the 'daring, decisive, power-filled call to live as Jesus lived.' Mystagogical Reflection is the way we do this. It is a time of growth for the whole community.

Mystagogical Reflection is a wonderful way of prayer and faith sharing that we have been encouraging for some time. It is for everyone, whether or not your parish hosts RCIA and irrespective of your association with the worshiping community. There are many resources available in our diocesan website, particularly Mystagogy Monday which my friend and colleague Rose is organising.


We all know the truth of Eamon Bredin's statement, 'in the mystery of the resurrection we are not faced with something over and done with, something imprisoned in the past, but an intensely present reality'. In this reality may we experience the love and forgiveness, the respect and valuing that holds us in sure and certain hope and raises us up to new life.

Wishing you an abundance of easter blessings as we continue on the way of kingdom obedience.



## **Second Reading**

Rv 1:9-13, 17-19

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse

I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever.

My name is John, and through our union in Jesus I am your brother and share your sufferings, your kingdom, and all you endure. I was on the island of Patmos for having preached God's word and witnessed for Jesus; it was the Lord's day and the Spirit possessed me, and I heard a voice behind me, shouting like a trumpet, 'Write down all that you see in a book.' I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lamp-stands and, surrounded by them, a figure like a Son of man, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle.

When I saw him, I fell in a dead faint at his feet, but he touched me with his right hand and said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One. I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld. Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

The word of the Lord.

All reply:

Thanks be to God.

## Gospel

Reader:

From the holy Gospel according to John.

All:

Glory to you, O Lord.

Jn 20:19-31

After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me,

so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.

For those whose sins you forgive,

they are forgiven;

for those whose sins you retain,

they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger

here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me.

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.
